The Brockett family came from England. Great, great grandparents settled on a farm near what is now Runnels, IA. Ellis D. Brockett, Glenn's father married Jenny (Browning) in 1908 in Boone, IA. Glenn, the second oldest of their four children, was born in Boone, May 5, 1910. Most of his childhood was spent on farms southeast of Des Moines.

Glenn graduated valedictorian of the class of 1928 from Carlisle High School where he participated in football, track, and debate teams three years as well as class plays two years and class presidency in his junior and senior years.

When he entered Iowa State College, Glenn was considering a legal career and became a member of the Varsity Debate Team for three years, however his interest in engineering developed and he completed a BS degree in Mechanical Engineering, graduating in 1935 after being on the Dean's Honors list four years and honored with the Varsity "I" for Debate.

Jasper Fisher was president of Fisher Governor Company when in 1935, Glenn was first employed as a design engineer. Glenn became assistant chief engineer in 1943, chief engineer in 1946, chief sales engineer in 1950 and sales manager in 1955. From 1960 to 1970 he was Vice President, Sales and Marketing, and Sales Consultant from 1970 to 1975.

Most of Glenn's 35 years at Fisher Governor were during the presidency of Bill Fisher, who set a high standard, maintained a first class company and treated employees generously. Glenn is proud of his development of the Fisher Displacement Type Liquid Level Controller, which became and is still the standard of the industry. Glenn also participated in the de-

velopment of the atomic bomb, 1942-46, for which Fisher Governor was cited with the "E" award.

Glenn and Pearl Marie (Collins) were married December 28, 1940. Their children are Glenn F. born November 5, 1941; Allen Milton, born October 29, 1943, died 1960; Diane Kay, born November 11, 1944; and Patricia Lee Warren, born January 31, 1947.

Many hours of public service have been given by Glenn, who was elected to the Iowa legislature, representing District 39 from 1972 to '78 and serving as chairman of the Iowa Capitol Planning Commission from 1972 through 1982 during which the Hoover and Wallace buildings were erected and the heating and cooling system for the Capitol complex were installed.

Locally, Glenn chaired the United Way fund drive in 1972 and has been president of the Marshalltown Medical and Surgical Center board of which he was a member more than ten years. He has been a member of Elmwood Country Club board and the board of Marshalltown Rotary club, being president of Rotary in 1983-84 and the recipient of Rotary's Kenneth Brintnall Memorial Award. Iowa State University cited Glenn for Professional Achievement in Engineering in 1978.

Since Pearl's death, Glenn has continued to live in the home they built at 502 Orchard Drive, Marshalltown.
