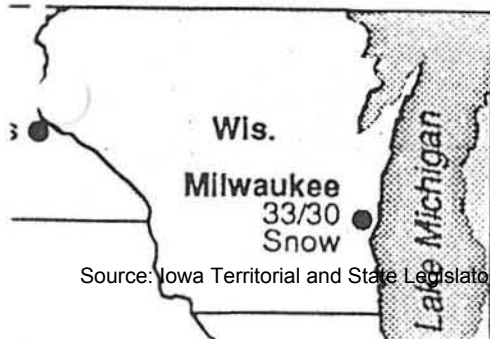

Ex-lawmaker Hargrave dies; 'made people think'

Whether the battleground was Korea, the Statehouse or a poker table, William Hargrave seemed to have an uncanny knack of outsmarting his opponents.

Former colleagues say they will miss his clever wit and extensive background in law enforcement. Hargrave, 62, an Iowa City Democrat who served in the Iowa House from 1970 to 1978, died Sunday of a heart ailment.

"He was a delightful guy — different," was how Rep. Minnette Doderer, D-Iowa City, described her late friend and colleague.

"You couldn't help but like Bill," she added. "He was always fair with people, but he liked to disturb people — make them think."

Doderer described Hargrave as "an intense lawmaker. He saw it as an opportunity to change things, and he did."

Sen. Richard Drake, R-Muscatine, a member of the Legislature since 1969, said Hargrave "was one of the most cheery guys we've had down

here . . . He was also a great poker player."

Hargrave was born in Tunica, Miss., and grew up in Chicago, according to his family.

During his more than 20 years of military service, Hargrave fought in both the Korean and Vietnam wars. He was honorably discharged as a master sergeant in the U.S. Army in 1967 and retired to Iowa City.

He then served as a Johnson County deputy sheriff for a short time before being elected to the House.

After being defeated in the Democratic primary in 1978, Hargrave worked as an investigator for the Black Hawk County public defender's office. He then was named chief investigator of the state public defender's office; he retired last June.

Hargrave is survived by his wife of 40 years, Edith K. Hargrave, five children, his mother, Magdelene Hargrave Gober, and a brother.

Visitation will be from 3 to 8 p.m. Thursday at the Donohue-Lensing Funeral Home in Iowa City. Services will be at 10 a.m. Friday at the funeral home, with burial in Rock Island, Ill.
