Cool re as solut

KANSAS CITY (AP) — A nation-wide beef giveaway program for needy persons was proposed today as a possible solution to an over supply of cattle on U.S. farms and ranches.

The president of the Missouri Cattlemen's Association said at a regional beef seminar a giveaway of 1 percent of all cattle in the nation would reduce the current beef glut and help the industry's poor public image.

Marshall McGregor, a Richland, Mo., cattelman, said the giveaway program which could involve as much as a million head of cattle, would be a positive step toward correcting the industry's depressed market.

McGregor also called for banning beef imports to protect domestic cattlemen during the beef glut.

The regional seminar, one of four the nation sponsored by the Department of Agriculture, is a gathering of beef industry leaders, agricultural extension specialists, farm credit executives. The seminar aimed at developing options for farmers and ranchers who are holding record numbers of cattle while market prices are low.

McGregor's giveaway program called for disposing of the cattle within 60 days.

McGregor's idea got a lukewarm reception from some other cattlemen attending the seminar, who said the motive was good but the practicality would be staggering.

"The logistics of it are impossible," said Virgil Huseman of the Kansas Livestock Association. "As a practical matter, it can't be accomplished, think Marshall (McGregor) is making a good point about the major problem facing us."

In other action today, the seminar heard a panel of farm credit experts outline the restrictions on money now confronting the cattle industry.

at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Dubuque. Mr. Clark's body was donated to the University of Iowa College of Medicine. He was born at Ottumwa, Ia., attended grade school there and at age 14 began a decade of work in southern Iowa coal mines.

His coal-mining days interrupted his education, but he graduated from Dubuque Senior High School in 1968 at the age of 56.

Mr. Clark sold construction equipment for 17 years and spent the last dozen years as a superintendent for Dubuque Blacktop Co.

He lost an Iowa House race in 1968 to Republican Ted Ellsworth, but won a three-way Democratic primary and defeated Republican Robin Steele to win his first House term in 1972. He had been an unopposed candidate for re-election this November.

He was assigned to the House Appropriations, County Government and Transportation committees, fought to secure collective-bargaining rights for public employes and successfully pushed for passage of an act nicknamed "Joe Clark's bill" in the legislature. That bill granted tax exemptions to Dubuque's Pickett Brewing Co.

He was sidelined by illness from the legislature last March, underwent surgery in May and had received chemotherapy treatment since that time in an effort to control cancer.

Mr. Clark was a member of Laborers Local 659, St. Mary's Parish, the Dubuque County Conservation Society, the Dubuque County Beekeepers Association and the Elks Club. He was appointed Dubuque County weed commissioner in 1971-72.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Louise; three daughters, Mrs. Dale (Joanne) Sharp of Bellevue, Ia., Mrs. David (Mary Ellen) Johnson of Montpelier, Ia., and Catherine of Florence, Ore.; a son, Patrick of Iowa City; two brothers, Frank of Ottumwa and Phillip of Peru, Ind.; two sisters, Mrs. James (Martha) Welsh of Cedar Rapids and Mrs. Mary Walker of Davenport; and 12 grandchildren.

Funding Hassle Threatens D.M. Correctional Facility

A women's residential correc-
tional facility at 3118 Cottage
Grove Ave. may close Oct. 15
unless the Iowa Crime Commis-
sion and the Department of
Court Services can reach an
agreement on funding the proj-
ect, Bernard Vogelgesang, di-
rector of court services, said
Tuesday.

However, Crime Commission
Director George Orr indicated
in an interview Tuesday after-
noon he would conditionally
approve a grant to keep the
facility open although he still
has questions.

Vogelgesang told the Polk
County Board of Supervisors
Tuesday morning that Orr
has not released more than
\$150,000 in state and federal
funds needed to keep the fa-
cility open.

"On Sept. 6, George Orr told
me we could have a grant (for
the \$150,000) approved by Oct.
1," Vogelgesang said in an in-
terview. "I have had almost
daily contact with the Crime
Commission and it has not ap-
proved the grant."

Orr, however, said Vogelge-
sang "never told me there was
a problem. I understood we had
until Nov. 1 to approve the
grant."

45 Days

"We received the grant appli-
cation Sept. 16," said Orr. "It
usually takes around 45 days to

approve a grant, but I guess
they (Department of Court
Services) just expected us to
drop everything and work on
their project."

"All at once I find Mr. Vo-
gelgesang going behind my
back and recommending they
close the facility unless I re-
lease the money," said Orr.
"But he never once contact-
ed me to tell me he had a prob-
lem."

Vogelgesang contends he
had wanted to open the Cot-
tage Grove facility in Novem-
ber but he said he had been
asked by Orr and State Di-
rector of Social Services Ke-
vin Burns to open it in Octo-
ber.

"The Department of Social
Services already was paying
over \$1,000 a month in rent on
the house (a former sorority
house), and they wanted to get
it open," said Vogelgesang. The
actual rent is \$1,590 per month,
according to George Kaiser,
program planner for the com-
munity corrections unit of the
department of Court Services.

The new facility, which can
house 35, opened recently. It is
occupied by four women clients
and has a staff of 13 — hired in
anticipation of more women
moving in after the \$150,000
grant is approved.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character, and public service of the late Honorable Joseph Warren Clark, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Joseph Warren Clark was born May 5, 1912, in Ottumwa, the son of Wycliff and Anna Burns Clark. He attended the Sacred Heart Elementary School and Ottumwa High School. He had to drop out of High School in his Junior year because his father broke his leg and his mother was ill. He felt so strongly about his education that when adult courses became available he attended night school and received his diploma from Dubuque Senior High.

He married Mary Louise Spurgeon on February 28, 1932, and to this union five children were born: Joanne, Mary Ellen, Catherine, David and Patrick.

Mr. Clark worked as a farmer, coal miner and iron worker. He helped organize the union at the Iron Works. He was the first Secretary-Treasurer of the C.I.O. in Ottumwa. He helped other companies to organize such as the Drain (which later became the John Deere Works at Ottumwa) and Barkers. He was vice president of the Iowa-Nebraska Conference. He worked for the improvement of safety laws and compensation as an unpaid lobbyist. He sold road construction equipment for fifteen years, was Weed Commissioner for Dubuque in 1972 and 1973, and was working for an asphalt paving company in Dubuque when he entered the legislature.

A Democrat, Mr. Clark served as State Representative from Dubuque in the Sixty-fifth General Assembly. He was re-elected for the Sixty-sixth General Assembly but died before he could take office.

Mr. Clark died of cancer in University Hospital, Iowa City, October 8, 1974. He donated his body to the University Hospital and his eyes to the Eye Bank. Memorial services were held in the St. Mary's Catholic Church, Dubuque, Iowa.

He was preceded in death by his son, David. Surviving are his wife, Mary Louise; three daughters, Mrs. David Johnson of Montpelier, Mrs. Dale Tharpe of Bellevue, and Catherine Clark of Florence, Oregon; a son, Patrick of Iowa City; two brothers, Phillip of Peru, Indiana, and Frank of Ottumwa; two sisters, Mrs. James Welsh of Cedar Rapids, and Mrs. Mary Walker of Davenport, and fifteen grandchildren.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-sixth General Assembly of Iowa: That in the passing of the Honorable Joseph Warren Clark, the state has lost an honored citizen and a faithful and useful public servant, and the House by this resolution would express its appreciation of his service, and tender its sympathy to the members of his family.

Be It Further Resolved: That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the Journal of the House, and that the Chief Clerk be directed to forward an enrolled copy to the family of the deceased.
