He was president of Lange Insurance Co. Inc.; president of the Dubuque Humane Society, of which he served on the board for the past 36 years; immediate past president of the Dubuque Boys' Club, of which he served on the board for 23 years; vice president of the Little Cloud Girl Scout Council; and president of Linwood Cemetery Association.

He headed the Girl Scout Camp fund drive in 1962; is a charter member of the Dubuque Softball Hall of Fame; received the Junior Achievement National Bronze Leadership Award; was Dubuque Jaycees Citizen of the Year in 1961; was founder and current board member of Dubuque Junior Achievement; was campaign chairman of the Dubuque United Way fund drive in 1960 and chairman of the board of the fund drive in 1961; and served in the state Legislature from 1969 to 1972.

He was county chairman of the March of Dimes from 1949-51; federal jury commissioner of the Northern District of Iowa for 12 years; spearheaded the merging of Catholic Charities and United Way; and was former senior warden of St. John's Episcopal Church, where he served on the vestry.

He received the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism against an armed enemy in a village in the Province of Lorraine in France in 1944.
