## to Resume Negotiating

Iowa Beef Processors, Inc., officials in Sioux City Friday night confirmed that negotiations will resume Tuesday in Washington in efforts to resolve a two-month work stoppage at the IBP plant in Dakota City.  
 W. J. Usery Jr., director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, said Friday the Tuesday meeting between representatives of the company and Local 222, Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America, will be the first negotiating session since receipt of a fact-finding report in the contract renewal suit.  
 About 2,000 workers normally are employed at the Dakota City plant which was struck by Local 222 in mid-July.  
 The resumption of talks seems to bear out predictions in the livestock industry that negotiations would begin in earnest as soon as the other major meat processors reached contractual agreements with the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen and as soon as the freeze on beef prices ended.  
 Either final or tentative agreements have been reached by Swift & Co., Wilson & Co., and Armour & Co., and the freeze on beef prices down to the producer level were scheduled to end at midnight Sept. 11. The time now has been set up to midnight Sept. 9.

Former State Rep. Andrew G. Dooley, 59, 3213 Virginia St., died Friday morning at the University of Iowa Hospitals in Iowa City after a lingering illness.  
 Mr. Dooley, who operated Dooley Drug Co. in Leeds for many years until retiring, served in the Iowa House as a Republican and ran for legislative office also on the Democratic ticket and as an independent.  
 He served on the Social Service, Human and Industrial Relations, Law Enforcement and Ways and Means committee during the 63rd General Assembly.

A graduate of the University of Iowa, Mr. Dooley was captain of the Hawkeye track team.  
 Mr. Dooley was affiliated with the Leeds Commercial Club; Masonic Triangle Lodge 643, AF&AM; Sioux City Consistory; Abu Bekr Shrine Temple, and was a charter member of the Sioux City Suburban Rotary Club, the Sioux City Pharmaceutical Association and the AFI honorary society and Phi Gamma Delta fraternity at the U of I.

# Morningside Convocations

A former foreign secretary of Great Britain, a retired admiral with controversial opinions on America's defense policies, a presentation of the works of Walt Whitman, and African music will highlight the morning convocation series this fall at Morningside College.

The 50-minute programs are presented on Wednesdays at 10 a.m. in Eppley Auditorium. Supported for the most part by college and student funds, they are open to students and the public at no admission charge.

Morningside President Thomas S. Thompson will open the series this Wednesday with an address entitled, "A Time for Reasoning." A presidential address is traditional during the opening of the convocation series and this will be the fourth such speech for Dr. Thompson, who came to Morningside in 1970.

On Sept. 19, Dr. James Miller Jr., professor of history and political science, will analyze the role of the liberal arts college in the world community.

A convocation-worship program, under the direction of the Rev. Ralph Brink, campus minister,

will be held on Sept. 26.

The Alpha and Omega Players, a group of Texas-based collegians, return to the campus on Oct. 3, presenting "Thurber Carnival," consisting of excerpts from the humorous pieces of James Thurber.

Great Britain's minister of state for foreign affairs and representative at the United Nations from 1964-70, Lord Caradon, will present two addresses on campus Oct. 10. Following his convocation speech, "Needed: New Initiative in International Affairs," he will appear before the Conference for Superintendents of Schools, sponsored annually by the college's Education Department.

The Homecoming convocation is scheduled for Oct. 17.

The Howard Hanger Trio, a group of young musicians playing a wide variety of popular music, will appear for the second year on Oct. 24.

The Iowa Arts Council will co-sponsor "Fajulawa" Oct. 31, featuring graduate students in music from the University of Iowa presenting African music played on African instruments. They

also will conduct a workshop that Morningside Music Department.

On Nov. 7 actor John Fields will appear in "Three Ages of Walt Whitman," drawn from "Leaves of Grass," in which Fields will make costume and makeup changes, portraying youth, maturity and old age. In Shakespearean roles, Fields appeared for four years in "Man of La Mancha."

Retired Adm. Gene R. La Rocque, Center for Defense Information in Washington, will analyze and evaluate the nation's defense and those of other countries on Oct. 12. He frequently has criticized U.S. defense policy and joined the center in April, 1972.

The traditional Thanksgiving convocation is scheduled for Nov. 21.

On Nov. 28, Dr. Raymond S. Johnson, president for academic affairs, will appear in a worship program, directed by Dr. Olson, Dec. 5 and the Religious Life Council, Theatre on Dec. 12 will conclude the fall semester.
