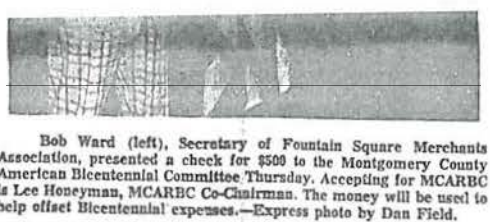

## Federal Assistance Sought In Acquiring Future Park

Application has been made for federal assistance in acquiring a second county park area by the Montgomery County Conservation Board, Randy Holl, Board Director, announces. The 230-acre future park site located 12 miles east of Red Oak and 3 1/4 miles north of Villisca on US 34, may qualify for federal assistance under the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LAWCON) Program. This program is administered in Iowa through the Iowa Conservation Commission.  
 The LAWCON fund provides matching reimbursement for acquisition of lands for outdoor recreation and conservation needs, Holl said.  
 In order to qualify, the area must be of sufficient quality to rate

highly in several selected criteria. The projects competing for the available funds are scored according to those criteria. The projects in Iowa with the highest total scores are then funded until the funds are exhausted, reports Holl.  
 The proposed site is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Archer, Route 2, Villisca.  
 "One of the reasons we selected this particular area was its greater potential to qualify for these funds," stated Holl. "The criteria are: quality of the site, recreational benefits of the project, local need, number of people served, the priority of the type of project according to the state recreation plan, and the

## '76 Property Assessments Reduced to 1973 Figures

Personal property assessments for 1976 have been totaled and were found to exceed 1973 valuations, Carol Renander, Montgomery County Assessor, announces. In order to equal the 1973 valuations, all personal assessments have been adjusted downward using a factor of 58.85, she said.  
 A legal notice to this effect appears elsewhere in this issue of The Express.  
 Personal property valuations in the county for 1976 prior to reduction were \$24,188,354. The

1973 total was \$14,239,574, Renander said.  
 The Code of Iowa states in part that "if the total assessed valuation exceeds the limitation established by this section, the assessor shall reduce the assessed value of each taxpayer's personal property by the same percentage so that the total assessed value of all personal property in the assessing jurisdiction shall be equal to the total actual value of all personal property in the assessing jurisdiction as of Jan. 1, 1973."

financial need of the agency involved.

"This project could score highly in all six criteria," Holl remarked. "There are quarterly reviews of the projects, so if the project fails to receive funds during the June review by the State Conservation Commission, it will still be eligible for funding consideration in the September and December reviews," Holl continued.

In order to qualify for LAWCON, which will not commit funds on acquisitions over more than a 3-year period, the Conservation Board has divided the Archer property into two tracts of about 115 acres each. The first tract is proposed to be purchased on a 2½-year contract arrangement. During this time the second tract will be rented. After the first contract is completed, it is proposed to purchase the second tract under a similar 2½-year contract. Each tract is to be purchased for \$62,500.

The LAWCON application made by the Conservation Board was for \$29,450. "This is half the appraised value of the first tract," Holl commented. "If the Archer property qualifies, this is the amount that would be reimbursed to the conservation fund after the contract is completed in 2½ years. At that time application would be made on the second tract of land," Holl continued. "We should know by late this month if the area qualifies for the funds during this review period.

"Of course, there is no guarantee that funds will be received from this program," Holl explained. "If funds can be obtained, though, it will help minimize the cost of this valuable project to the county."
