There will be no increase in taxes to be paid in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1976.

Legal publication of the notice of hearing and certificate to amend the current budget appears else-where in this issue and includes listing of the funds to be increased and amount of the increases.

Assessor Tells **Exemption Date**

Carol Renander, Montgomery County Assessor, has issued a re-minder that the homestead and military exemption deadline is July 1 and no applications will be received after that date.

He states:

"Any person who has recently purchased a home, whether by deed or contract, is urged to make application immediately in order to avail themselves of this credit. This is the credit due on the 1976 taxes due in 1977-78.

"This credit is not automatic and must be signed each year. Any person who owns homestead property in Iowa, and who is ac-tually occupying the property as his or her homestead is eligible to apply for homestead credit. The applicant must intend to occupy his dwelling as a home for at least six months of the year for which the credit is claimed. The assessor said that it an applicant in good faith applied for a homestead credit but for some valid reason was unable to actually occupy his homestead for six months, he is entitled to the credit.

"It is the responsibility of each homestead credit claimant to file an application for his or her homestead each year. A claimant must also have evidence of ownership of his homestead on file in the Clerk of Court or County Recorder's

Federal Assistance Sought In Acquiring Future Park

"One of the reasons we selected this particular area was its greater potential to qualify for these funds," stated Holl. "The criteria are: quality of the site, recreational benefits of the project, local need, number of people served, the priority of the type of project according to the state recreation plan, and the

"There are quarterly reviews of the projects, so if the project fails to receive funds during the June review by the State Conservation Commission, it will still be eligible for funding consideration in the September and December reviews," Holl continued.

order to qualify for In LAWCON, which will not commit funds on acquisitions over more than a 3-year period, the Conservation Board has divided the Archer property into two tracts of about 115 acres each. The first tract is proposed to be purchased on a 21/2-year contract arrangement. During this time the second tract will be rented. After the first contract is completed, it is proposed to purchase the second tract under a similar 21/2-year contract, Each tract is to be purchased for

The LAWCON application made by the Conservation Board was for \$29,450. "This is half the appraised value of the first tract," Holl commented. "If the Archer property qualifies, this is the amount that would be reimbursed to the conservation fund after the contract is completed in 21/2 years. At that time application would be made on the second tract of land," Holl continued. "We should know by late this month if the area qualifies for the funds during this

review period.
"Of course, there, is no guarantee that funds will be received from this program," Holl explained. "If funds can be obtained, though, it will help minimize the cost of this valuable project to the county."


