Henry W. Busch, 61, of Waverly, died Tuesday af-ternoon, Aug. 11, at Allen Memorial Hospital in Waterloo. Mr. Busch entered the Waverly Municipal Hospital on Saturday evening, suffered a heart attack on Sunday, and was transferred to Allen Hospital Tuesday

morning. He was born on July 15, 1920 in Bristow, the son of Henry and Bielda Ludeman Busch. He graduated from Allison High School in 1936 and then farmed in partnership with his brother, George, near Allison. He entered the U.S. Army during W.W. II in 1942, served 36 months in combat in the European Theatre where he was awarded the Purple Heart and Bronze Star.

Following his discharge in January 1946, he returned to the Allison area. On Feb. 22, 1946 he was united in marriage to Matrine L. Busch in the Little Brown Church in Nashua. The couple farmed near Allison and in 1949 moved to a farm south of Waverly.

Henry was elected as State Representative in 1962 and served in the legislature until 1968. In 1966 he started in the real estate profession in the Waverly area, and in 1971 formed Busch-McKee Inc. Realtors in Waverly in partnership with John McKee.

Henry was a member of rinity United Methodist Trinity Church in Waverly and served on many committies in the church. He was a member of the Board of Directors of the First National Bank of Waverly, was a member of the Waverly Amvet Post and the Waverly V.F.W. Post, was past president of the Waverly Chamber of Commerce, past president of the Bremer, Butler, Chickasaw Board of Realtors, past president of the Bremer Co. Farm Bureau,

Henry Busch died in 1981. His son Paul relates his father's World War II experiences:

"My dad told me how rough the ocean was going over (everyone was sick). It was extremely cold in France and Germany—my dad crawled under two German tanks one night to hook up telephone wires (this was when he received a bronze star).

"He also told me of being one of the first units to liberate concentration camps." He saw Landsberg Prison and said how horrible the sights were.

"Landsberg Prison is also where Hitler wrote Mein Kampf.

"On a lighter note, Dad told me of coming into a town that had a warehouse filled with fresh eggs—up until then it was all powdered."
