

Milton Distelhorst, a longtime local Democratic Party official, died Friday after a long illness. He was 77.

Distelhorst, who farmed for more than 40 years in his native Jackson Township, was a Des Distelhorst Moines County su-

pervisor and a state representative in the 1960s. In the 1950s and '60s, he was a member of the Des Moines County Democratic Party Central Committee.

In 1964, he was elected to the state Legislature, serving two terms in the House of Representatives. Throughout his political career, Distelhorst said there should be frequent changes in office.

"The more individuals who will run for and accept the responsibility of public office, the closer government comes to the people," he said in March 1968, when he announced he wouldn't run again for the House.

Distelhorst, a World War II veteran, was a member of the first Des Moines County Extension Council formed after the

Farm Bureau and Extension Service were split. He also served three years on the Jac son Township Agricultural St. bilization and Conservatio Committee. In 1977 Presiden Jimmy Carter appointed him the Iowa state Agricultural St. bilization and Conservation Se vice committee.

He also served as a Jackson Township trustee and, at th time of his death, was in h .Oth year as a trustee of th Des. Moines County Drainag District No. 7.


