Prior to World War I, the family retired in Masonville, but when their oldest son James returned from serving in the armed forces they started farming again south of Masonville on the Biddle Farm. John and Minnie retired once again in 1929 in Waterloo, Iowa where their three daughters, Mabel, Alice and Florence resided. John, Sr. died May 30, 1938 and Minnie died November 6, 1939.

One ironic incident about the Patton family was the fact that James who was a Republican was a State Representative and John who was a Democrat was a State Senator during the 1967-68 legislative session.

John was active in many community organizations including serving on the R.E.C. board for 23 years.

John and Alma Patton's two children are Lois J. born April 19, 1935 and Douglas John born December 21, 1940.

Lois married Norman J. Brimmer August 11, 1956. Their six children are Kevin, Kraig, Kory, Kelly, Kyron, and Cherise Ann.
