Funeral services for Carl C. Anderson, pioneer resident of this vicinity, were held Wednesday Sept. 29, at 2 p.m. in the Methodist church, conducted by the Rev. Everett H. Staats.

Pallbearers were Paul Smith, Tom Gourley, Ivan Carmichael, Welden Larson, Lester Anderson, and Paul Bolt, and interment was in the Arlington cemetery beside Mr. Anderson's wife who preceded him in death many years ago. Carl C. Anderson, who was born in Sweden June 8, 1873, died at the Red Oak hospital, Sept. 24, 1954, following a stroke which he suffered that morning.

He was a resident of this vicinity for more than fifty years, having immigrated to this county in fall of 1890. He first lived near Emerson, Ia., where he was employed as a farm hand. Thirteen years later he moved with his family to a farm northwest of Villisca where he lived most of his life.

It was on August 25, 1897, he was married to Mary Jones of Osceola, Ia. They became parents of five children, all of whom survive their father.

Mr. Anderson lived a very active life. In addition to his farm and family responsibilities, he entered actively into the work of the church and politics. He was a member of the Methodist church in Villisca where he attended for many years until his health began to fail. For many years he served as adult Bible class teacher in the Morton Mills church and sang in the choir. He served two terms in the Iowa legislature and was a member of the Montgomery County AAA Committee for a number of years, during which time he lived in Red Oak.

He was a member of the Red Oak Masonic lodge and a past master of that lodge, also a thirty-second

degree Mason. He was taken to Rosary hospital in Corning.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Carl C. Anderson, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Carl C. Anderson was born in Sweden, June 8, 1873, and passed away at Murphy Memorial Hospital in Red Oak, Iowa, on September 29, 1954. He received his early schooling in the rural schools of Sweden.

Mr. Anderson came to the United States in 1890 and worked as a farm laborer in Mills County.

He was naturalized and cast his first vote for president in 1896.

In 1901, Mr. Anderson bought a farm in Montgomery County and was a resident of that county for more than fifty years.

Mr. Anderson was married to Miss Mary Jones August 25, 1897. His wife lost her life in an automobile accident April 20, 1914. Surviving him are four daughters and one son.

Mr. Anderson was a member of the Forty-first, Forty-second and Forty-second Extra sessions of the General Assembly of Iowa.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, Order of the Eastern Star, Masons, Scottish Rite Masons and was a member of the AAA County Committee, acting as chairman for a number of years.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly of Iowa: That in the passing of the Honorable Carl C. Anderson, the people of Montgomery County and the entire State of Iowa have sustained a great loss and the House expresses its appreciation of his character and public service and tenders, by this resolution, its sincere and heartfelt sympathy to his beloved family in their great sorrow and loss.
