



SCHERLE/GOLDAPP **FAMILIES**

Our family history in Mills County began with the purchase of a 320-acre farm in Section 7, Anderson Township, in 1931 by Thomas Capel. One of his daughters, Verne Capel Goldapp, inherited the east half of this farm in 1940. Verne and her husband, Frank, operated this farm, along with other farms they owned, while living in Council Bluffs, farming with the help of hired men and German prisoners of war from the POW camp in Clarinda, Iowa. In the early 1940's, they purchased the west half of Section 6 and bought the east half in 1947.

In 1947, their daughter, Jane, enrolled at Baylor University in Dallas, Texas became engaged to William J. Scherle, a native of Little Falls, New York, who was attending Southern Methodist University. They were married in June of that year and moved back to Iowa the following year to a home they built on the east half of Section 6. This was to become the Scherle "home place," with a son, Bill, Jr. born in 1950 and another son, John, born in 1952. Both attended Nishna Valley High School and were very active in school activities and 4-H.

Bill, Jr. graduated from Texas A&M University and Creighton Law School. He served Iowa as an Assistant Attorney General and later was appointed to the office of Assistant U.S. Attorney. He has been with the Des Moines law firm of Hansen, McClintock and Riley since 1976.

John earned his degree in journalism from Creighton University. After graduation he was employed by The Malvern Leader and The Treynor Record, purchased The Carson Times and moved the operation to Oakland. He sold the newspaper soon after to become the assistant editor for the Bellevue Leader in Nebraska. He

resigned this position in 1982 to become the Director of Member Relations for the Farm Credit Banks in Omaha, Nebraska.

At the peak of the farming operation, Frank, and several hired men farmed a total of 960 s. Frank later retired and Bill continued the grain and livestock operation into the late 1960's. Several German "displaced persons," or refugees, came to the farms to live during the 1950's. These families were of Polish and German descent and many went on to find jobs in Omaha and other cities.

In 1960, Bill was elected to serve in the State Legislature, representing both Mills and Fremont counties. He served three terms. In 1966. he was elected to Congress and served Iowa's Fifth District for four terms. After working with the USDA in Washington, D.C. for two years, Bill started his own Washington based consulting firm, representing both foreign and domestic interests. Jane and Bill live on the home farm

while commuting on a regular basis.

Frank Goldapp died at the age of 89 in 1983. At the time of this writing (April, 1985), Verne Goldapp, age 92, still lives in Council Bluffs; Bill and Jane live on the home place; and Bill, Jr. lives in Des Moines with his wife, Joan, and two daughters, Megan, 5; and Mary, 3. John lives on the original Capel farm with his wife, Janet and three daughters, Rachel, 7; Beth, 5; and Rebecca, 3. Janet formerly lived in Massachusetts. Ironically, records show this farm was first deeded from the United States Government to a party from Suffolk County, Massachusetts in 1856. Submitted by Jane Goldapp Scherle

SCHIEFELBEIN FAMILY

Johann Gottlieb Schiefelbein, born June 3, 1834; died June 24, 1907, and Wilhelmina Schultz born April 11, 1841; died June 13, 1923 Virchow, Pommern, Germany were united in riage November 25, 1865.

This marriage was blessed with eight children, four of which, three boys and one girl, died in infancy. Three daughters and one son survived.

The eldest daughter, Emma, born April 5, 1870; died April 22, 1940, immigrated to America on October 12, 1892. Emma came to Hastings, Iowa, and made her home with friends and relatives. In 1894, Emma married W. Louis Pontow, and established their home in Ingraham Township. They were parents of four children: Walter, Paul, Marie and Elsie.

Emilie Schiefelbein, born November 14, 1874; died July 27, 1964. She came to America in 1893, followed by her only brother, William C. Shiefel-hein, born 1878; died 1955, who came to Hass, Iowa in 1895.

milie Schiefelbein was united in marriage to Hugo Pontow, May 18, 1899. They purchased a farm in Indian Creek Township and were the parents of two children, Ernest and Martha.

William C. Schiefelbein never married, worked as a laborer in the area. William made his home with elawaet until has actions make Lieo Grators cil Bluffs, Iowa where he died in 1955.

Eliza Sofia Schiefelbein, born July 17, 1883, was 13 years of age when she left Germany with her parents embarking from Bremen, Germany, June 24, 1897, landing in Baltimore, Maryland, thence by train to Hastings, Iowa where they were welcomed by their family members and relatives, who previously settled in Mills County.

Eliza attended Golden Hill school several terms and assisted with housework in the homes of the area.

On April 10, 1907, Eliza was united in marriage to Emil Leu. After their marriage they established a new home and other buildings in northeast Silver Creek Township.

Emil and Eliza spent the rest of their years upon this farm, raising crops and feeding live-

stock.

Two sons, Edwin G. and Gerald A. were born to this union. To the best of our knowledge, no immediate descendants of the Schiefelbein name remain.

In 1943, Emil and Eliza purchased a home in Malvern, Iowa, planning to retire from the farm

where they had resided for 36 years.

Just before they were to move into their new home, Eliza, after a brief illness died April 5, 1944 at the Jennie Edmundson Hospital of Council Bluffs.

Emil continued to live in Malvern, Iowa until Parkinson's disease developed impairing his physical activities, until his death in Mercy Hospital October 27, 1955.

Emil and Eliza are buried at East Liberty Cemetery. Submitted by Edwin Leu

WILLIAM SCHIERMEIER

In the 1800's there was a method in place whereby people in America could contact potential help in the old country. The agreement was that the emigrant's passage was paid, for a prescribed amount of work to be done after arrival in America. Such a plan brought William Schiermeier to Mills County about 1887 or 1888. Henry Brandt, a farmer in northeast Mills County, sent \$104.00 to William for passage by boat across the ocean and by train to the Kiel Hotel in Council Bluffs. The arrangement was made that William was to help clear land on the Missouri bottom just north of the present day Bellevue Bridge

William Schiermeier was born on May 21, 1870 in Westphalen, Germany. He spoke no English when he came to America but subscribed to a German newspaper and read it regularly. He learned English after arrival in this country

After completing his agreement with Henry Brandt, William became a farmer. He farmed 11 years on a place just one quarter mile east of the present day Aidex plant. Later he moved to his own farm southwest of Silver City.

William married Emma Arp on March 3, 1897. This marriage produced two sons, the first born about 1900, died when he was six weeks old. The second, William J. (Bill), was born July 13, 1902. Bill supplied most of the information for this profile.

Emma Arp, a descendant of immigrants, was born May 19, 1874. She died in November, 1919 and is buried by the side of William in the Salem Lutheran (Plumer) Cemetery in the north part of

Mills County

A story of the move from near the Aidex plant to the farm near Silver City is an example of the extreme hardships encountered by the people of that day. The day they started was very cold with temperatures well below zero. The cattle and hogs were driven about 3 miles to a rail site and loaded on cars to be taken to Silver City. The horses were hitched to wagons. A caravan of three wagons left home about eleven o'clock in the morning headed for Glenwood a distance of about six or seven miles. The cats and dog were put in a straw filled box atop one of the wagons. After a short time the dog put up a fuss and was allowed to walk. The little caravan jostled over the rough frozen roads and finally arrived in Collection darkputed is a visual time of a restation of the second of th box with the cats was opened, they had frozen to

death. The party slept that night in a partially heated upstairs room on mattresses thrown on the floor. They arrived the next day at their new farm just as the cattle and hogs were being driven in by the ever helpful "neighbors". At milking time it was found that the cows' teats were badly

After his wife's death that same year William and his son, Bill, continued farming this land. Bill married Mildred Maddocks June 18, 1924. William spent the remainder of his life living with Bill and Mildred. He died in 1938.

Bill and Mildred farmed in various locations in Mills County. After leaving farming Bill spent many years filling many roles at different times in Glenwood. He operated a feed store, was greenskeeper at the Glenwood Golf Course, and worked at the old Texaco station. Mildred died January 2, 1969 and is buried in Salem Lutheran Cemetery, Later Bill married Osie Hummel Hetzel, residing in Glenwood several years. They now reside in Tabor where he is still very active with his garden. Submitted by Wayne E. Hetzel

ANTOIN SCHLUMPFF

Antoin Schlumpff (later spelled Slumpf, then Slump) was the father of Edward, who was born March 30, 1842, in Waslow, France. His mother died when he was born. Antoin then married Mary Ames from Hungary. They had five children: Louisa was born in 1845 in France; Frank was born in 1847 in Hungary, and Caroline born in 1849 in Hungary. One source of information says that Edward and his father Antoin came to America in 1848 when he was six years old. They settled at Henderson County, Illinois. Another said he was eight years old. We are not sure if the family all came at the same time or the mother and other children came later in 1857. They settled at Oquawka, Illinois.

They had two children after arriving in this country: Henry S., born in 1859 and Mary who died at five months. Antoin died at age 69 and Henry S. died September 28, 1878, aged 13 years 10 months. This information was obtained on the tombstones in Oquawka.

Edward Slump grew to manhood in Oquawka, Illinois and when he was 19 years of age joined the army as a member of the 11th Missouri Cavalry on September 17, 1861. The regiment was known as Black Hawk Cavalry. He was injured and taken prisoner and was given an honorable discharge on August 25, 1862 at St. Louis, Mis-

souri.

He married Louisa Abigail Jones from Mount Vernon, Ohio, on November 13, 1865. In later years Louisa seems to be known as Eliza. He received his naturalization papers on May 17, 1866. They moved to Warren County near New Virginia in 1867 where they lived for nine years. They had eight children: Effie (Bell) was born in 1866, Allie (Minett) born in 1870, and Charles Edward born August 13, 1873 (story elsewhere).
The family moved to Mills County in 1876
