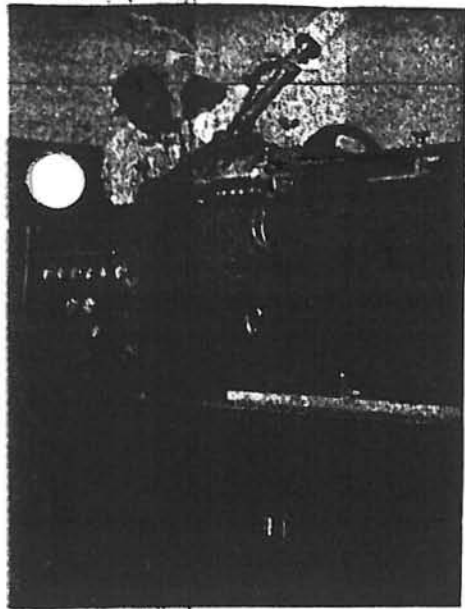

McNamara Target Of Goldwater

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Barry Goldwater called today for the resignation of Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara, urged an all-out bombing of Hanoi industrial complexes and blamed Governors William W. Scranton and Nelson Rockefeller, both Republicans, for his defeat in last year's presidential election.

In a taped television interview with newscaster Vince Leonard of KYW (Westinghouse) entitled "One Year Later," Goldwater also said the Johnson administration had turned down his request to visit Viet Nam as a reserve general in the Air Force.

Speaking from his home in Phoenix, the former Arizona senator said the resignation of McNamara "would be the best thing that could happen in our war effort. He has had too big a say in making foreign policy."

Goldwater, who was soundly beaten by President Johnson in the 1964 election, said McNamara's policies have reduced the morale in the Pentagon to an all-time low.

Goldwater said the war in Viet Nam could be ended in a relative few months if "we would say to Hanoi you are no longer a sacred place."

He urged heavy bombing of "not the city—we are not people killers," but industrial targets.

On politics he said the attacks by Rockefeller, of New York, and Scranton, of Pennsylvania, describing him as trigger happy and out to destroy Social Security hurt most in his bid for the presidency.

"They said it so often that people believed it," he asserted.

LeRoy Chalupa, Former County Lawmaker, Dies

PLEASANT PLAIN, Ia. — LeRoy Chalupa, former state representative from Jefferson county, died at 12:25 p. m. Monday at the Veterans hospital in Iowa City.

He had been in failing health the past few years and seriously ill since Oct. 25. He entered the hospital at Iowa City on that date.

Funeral services will be Thursday, Nov. 4, at the Friends church in Pleasant Plain with the Rev. Richard Hartman officiating. Burial will be in the Friends cemetery at Pleasant Plain. The body is at the Raymond funeral home.

Chalupa served as state representative from Jefferson county for five full terms, or for a period of ten years. He was first elected to the House in 1954. He served as a representative through 1964.

During his third and fourth terms he served as chairman of the House military and veterans affairs committee. He was also chairman of the private corporations committee.

Other major committee assignments include ways and means; schools, motor vehicles, commerce and trade, and highway safety.

During his fifth term in office he was chairman of the elections and judicial districts committee. He also served on the military and veterans affairs, fish and game, tax revision and ways and means committee.

A native of the Pleasant Plain community, he has lived in that area all of his life. Until his health failed him he was a farmer and a businessman.

Born In 1912

LeRoy Wilfred Chalupa, 52, was born Dec. 13, 1912, at Pleasant Plain, the son of Frank and Katharine Hoefert Chalupa. He was reared and educated in Pleasant Plain and attended Parsons college in Fairfield.

He was married March 20, 1935, to Dora Anderson who survives. The wedding took place in the Little Brown church at Nashua, Iowa.

In addition to his serving the county as representative for 10 years, he also served his community in other capacities and was a member of several service organizations.

He had served as mayor of Pleasant Plain. He was a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies, Consistory, he was a 32nd Degree Mason, a member of the Shrine, BPO Elks, the VFW, American Legion, Farm Bureau

Pilot Saved In Dramatic Sea Rescue

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. combat troops reported 92 Communist guerrillas killed and 26 captured in fighting in central Viet Nam today and Monday.

Men of the 1st Air Cavalry Division, who arrived in Viet Nam only seven weeks ago, fought three engagements against an enemy force of between 500 and 600 men near the U.S. Special Forces camp at Plei Me, 210 miles north of Saigon.

Regulars Found

The airborne cavalrymen reported they killed 88 of the enemy, captured 26 others and picked up 26 suspects. A U.S. spokesman said North Vietnamese regulars were among those killed and captured.

There was no word on American casualties.

The Plei Me camp underwent a week-long siege before the Communists were routed last week. The cavalrymen have been hunting down Viet Cong and North Vietnamese in the area since then.

The Viet Cong attacked an outpost near Qui Nhon, on the coast 260 miles north of Saigon, but a U.S. spokesman said paratroopers of the 101st Airborne Division fought off the assault and killed four Viet Cong. The Americans suffered light casualties, the spokesman said.

Plane Hit

In the northernmost sea rescue of the war, Capt. Norman P. Huggins of Mullins, S.C., was picked up after his plane was hit by conventional ground fire over a Communist surface-to-air missile site 35 miles northeast of Hanoi, a military spokesman reported.

Huggins headed out over the South China Sea and bailed out 57 miles east of Haiphong, North Viet Nam's major port. He spent an hour in a life raft before he was rescued by a plane piloted by Capt. David P. Westenburger of Fairfield, Ohio.

During the rescue, two U.S. dive bombers shot up a North Vietnamese sampans that was heading for the downed man and firing machine guns at him. Huggins was reported in good condition.

Photo Mission

Huggins was on a photo-reconnaissance mission over three SAM launching sites which U.S. planes attacked Sunday. Pilots after the strikes said they left one site in ruins, knocked the two others out of action and destroyed a key highway bridge in the area.

Speed Mark

HONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah (AP) — Craig Breedlove drove his jet-powered car 566 miles per hour today and set a world land speed record of 555.127 m.p.h.

The record is the average of two runs, back and forth, over a measured mile. In his first run the speed was 544.382 m.p.h. and on the return he was timed at 566.394 m.p.h.

The old record set by Art Arfons of Akron, Ohio, was 538.71 m.p.h.

Arfons probably will try to regain the record next week. He has been willing to see what Breedlove does.

v Russian Spy Aided Medley In 1962 Crisis

ORK (AP) — News-magazine reports that a spy assured President Kennedy during the missile crisis that "near forces were not of war readiness." issue out Monday the story cites the activist Col. Oleg Penkov-

sky, executed by the Russians in 1963.

Penkovsky's memoirs, now being edited for publication, are said to reveal that he passed to Britain and the United States some 5,000 bits of military, political and economic intelligence.

"Penkovsky knew full well that eventually the Soviet security apparatus would find him," the magazine article says. "But if the story that has been accepted in intelligence circles over the past few years is correct, he may at least have had the satisfaction of knowing that it was his greatest contribution to the West that led to his final downfall.

"Three days before John F. Kennedy delivered his dramatic ultimatum to Khrushchev at the height of the Cuban missile crisis, the story goes, the late president asked his advisers how he could be sure he was not touching off a nuclear war. "He was told that the only way to find out was to check with 'our most secret source in Moscow."

"Do it," said the president—and 32 hours later the answer came back: "Soviet nuclear forces not in a state of war." The secret source, of course, was Penkovsky, and the message he sent probably cost him his life.

France, Russia Ask Settlement

MOSCOW (U. S. D. A.) — France and the Soviet Union called today for a Viet Nam peace settlement based on an end to outside interference in the internal affairs of the divided country. The proposal—restating a position which both the French and the Soviet governments have taken previously — was made in a joint communique at the end of five days of talks between French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville and top Soviet leaders.

Crushed By Machine, Iowa Workman Dies

BURLINGTON (U. S. D. A.) — Calvin Wilbert Lowenberg, 41, died at a hospital here Tuesday of injuries suffered Saturday in an accident on a road construction job. Lowenberg was employed by Leonard Wilson and Son of Donnellson on a road grading project near Wever, about eight miles north of Fort Madison. Authorities said he fell off an earth moving machine which then ran over him.

Iowa Publisher's Wife, Brother Die

CHEROKEE (U. S. D. A.) — The wife and brother of Dwight Clark, Cherokee newspaper publisher, died within five hours of each other Monday. Mrs. Clark, 57, who suffered a heart attack Oct. 14, died at a Cherokee hospital. B. E. Clark, 63, of Ames died at a hospital there of pneumonia and complications. He had been in failing health, the family said. Services for Mrs. Clark will be here Thursday morning. Dwight Clark is publisher of the Daily Times and weekly Courier.

Food Rationing

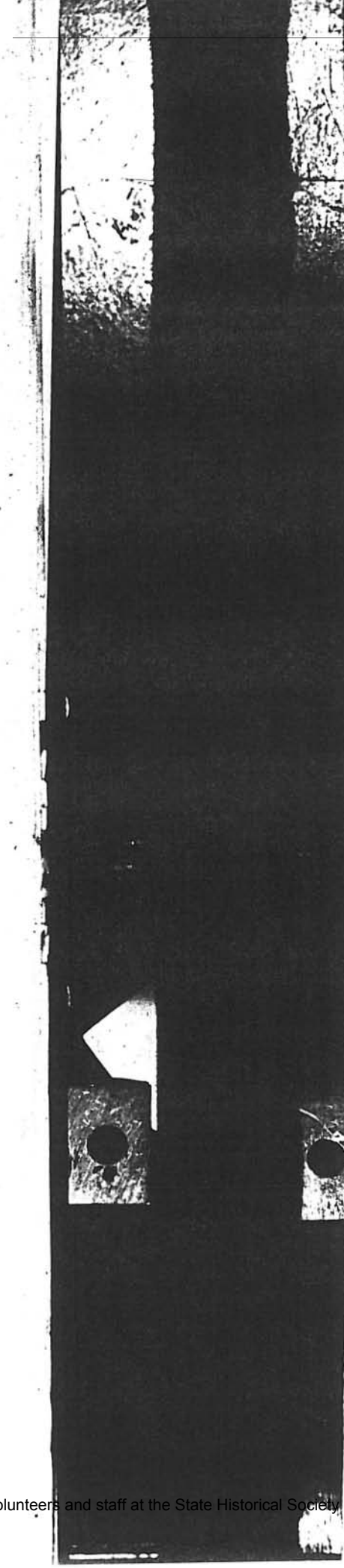

Officers Probe Iowa Shooting

BASSETT (AP) — Chickasaw County Sheriff Galen E. Folkers was investigating Tuesday the death, apparently by shooting, of Mrs. Mary Hugelbach, 72, and the wounding of her son, Clayton Hugelbach. The son was hospitalized at New Hampton with a chest wound.

Folkers said Hugelbach called the sheriff's office Monday afternoon and asked that an officer be sent to Mrs. Hugelbach's home here because of "family trouble." Hugelbach's house is about one-quarter of a mile from his mother's.

The sheriff said his deputy and a highway patrolman found Mrs. Hugelbach dead "with perforation wounds, assumed to be gunshot wounds" and Hugelbach nearby shot in the chest.

Folkers said officers could not immediately determine who fired the shots, or whether they were purposeful or accidental. He said there was no indication that any third party was involved.

28 Killed In Mexico Crash

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A train derailed a bus in two at a crossing near the Teotihuacan pyramids Monday, killing 28 persons and injuring 14 others, officials reported. The train was en route to Mexico City from Veracruz.

Teotihuacan is about 25 miles northeast of Mexico City. It is the site of the famous pyramid of the Sun and the ruins of the ancient Toltec and Aztec.

Police said the bus driver apparently tried to race over the crossing ahead of the train. The driver, among 14 persons trapped in the forward part of the bus, was among those killed. Wreckage and bodies were hurled 200 feet by the impact of the crash.

Growing Food Puts Nasser Puts

CAIRO (AP) — Facing a food shortage, U.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nasser seems to have found nowhere to turn but to the United States.

Both the Soviet Union and Red China are themselves importing wheat. West Germany and Britain might help, but Egypt no longer has diplomatic relations with Bonn and has antagonized Britain by supporting rebels in South Arabia. Some French wheat apparently is available but only on commercial terms.

Nasser has liberally criticized the United States in the past, but U.S. officials here say that they are urging Washington to act favorably on an approach for help.
