Irving D. Long, Longtime Attorney Dies; Rites Today

Irving D. Long, 77, for 51 years an attorney in Manchester, passed away late Thursday evening at the Delaware County Memorial hospital following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services for Mr. Long will be held today (Monday) at 1:30 p.m. at the Shelly funeral home. The Rev. Walter E. Schiel will officiate and burial will be made in the family lot in Oakland cemetery. Masonic services for Mr. Long were conducted at the funeral home Sunday evening by Manchester Lodge No. 165 A.F. and A.M.

Irving Daniel, son of Aivah D. and Carrie Carpenter Long, was born April 15, 1895, on the parental farm north of Delaware. At the age of two years he came with his parents to Manchester where they lived for two years and then moved to Tripp, S. D., in 1899.

In 1900 he started his elementary education in the schools of Tripp, S. D., and he attended schools there until 1906 when he returned with his family to Manchester. He completed his education in the schools of Manchester and graduated from the Manchester high school in 1915.

In the fall of 1915 he entered the law school of the University of South

Chu was born in China in 1935. His father was a farmer and Eddie's family lived on the delta of the Yangtze and Yellow rivers about 500 miles from Peking. Because of the Communistic activity in the area, Eddie's family was forced to flee to Shanghai in 1946.

His memory about the trip is somewhat vague, but he does remember that his father converted into gold everything of value that the family owned. The gold was then sewn into the lining of the children's clothes. Whenever possible the family traveled by train. However, much of the journey was made on foot and at times food was scarce. Eddie, his sister and two brothers lost a lot of weight — so much weight that little Eddie had great difficulty in keeping

Dakota at Vermillion. He was united in marriage with Ella Mae Cates on Sept. 13, 1916, at Waterloo. They made their home at Vermillion where he continued with his law education. He received his law degree in 1919 and then Mr. and Mrs. Long moved to Des Moines where he was employed in the state treasurer's office. He was employed there until 1921 when they came back to Manchester and he opened his law practice here.

He served as Delaware county attorney from 1923 until 1929. From 1930 until 1940 he served as a member of the Manchester Park commission. From 1941 through 1942 he served as a state senator from this district. From 1952 until 1957 he served as mayor of Manchester. In 1957 he was re-elected to the state senate and served in that capacity until 1965.

Mr. Long was a 50-year member of Manchester Lodge No. 165 A.F. and A.M., a member of Olive Branch Chapter, No. 42 R.A.M., Elkan Council No. 2 R. & S.M. and Nazareth Commandery No. 23, Knights Templar and was a past commander of the Commandery. He was also a 50-year member of the Knights of Pythias Lodge No. 186 of Manchester and a longtime member of the Manchester Lions club. He was also a member of the Christian church of Des Moines.

Mr. Long is survived by his wife; two sisters, Mrs. Ruby Timmons and Miss Gertrude Long, both of Manchester, and by several nieces, nephews and other relatives.

He was preceded in death by his parents, one brother, Wade Long, and by two brothers and one sister in infancy.

CURRIED HAM ROLLS (Simplified Version)

- 1/3 cup butter or margarine
- 1/3 cup flour
- 1 teas. curry powder
- Scant 1/2 teas. salt
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- 1 1/2 cups cooked rice
- 2 tbsps. finely chopped onion
- 1 tbsps. minced parsley
- Dash pepper
- 12 slices bottled ham

To make sauce, melt butter and blend in flour, curry powder, and scant 1/4 teaspoon salt. Add milk gradually; cook and stir until thickened into sauce. Combine 1/2 cup sauce with rice, onion, parsley, pepper and remaining one-fourth teaspoon salt. Spread the filling over ham slices. Roll up each, and place seam side down in shallow baking dish. Cover with remaining sauce. Bake about 25-30 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves six.

For hearty eating at its best try:

PORK CHOP LOAF

- 6 3/4-inch pork loin chops
- Shortening
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 4 cups bread cubes, partially dry
- 1 teas. salt
- 1/2 teas. pepper
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup finely chopped parsley

In shortening, brown chops lightly. Cook onion and celery in butter until golden but not brown. Combine remaining ingredients; add onion and celery. Place one chop upright, bone side down, at each end of a 10x5x3-inch loaf pan. Alternate chops and stuffing, and run skewers through chops, forming loaf. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour, or until done. Garnish. Makes six servings.

Your hungry family will go for a quicker variation that involves commercial stuffing mix. Simply prepare the mix according to directions, and use it as a substitute for the stuffing in the recipe above.
