### JOHN WILLIAM WALTER

John William Walter was born November 1, 1872 on a farm near Corning, Iowa. He was the sop of Henri and Maria Louisa (Schafroth) Both of his parents came to this country switzerland with their respective families, settling first in Ohio. In 1868 Henri and his wife left Ohio and settled on a farm near Corning. As a young man, John and his brothers herded cattle and other livestock on the open prairie of Mercer Township. In the 1890's John and his cousin, Charles, left Iowa for Oklahoma where they homesteaded on the Cherokee Strip. It was here that he met and married Belle Suman of Cushing, Oklahoma.

Belle Suman was the daughter of Jacob and Mary Ann (Bowman) Suman. Born in Soldier, Kansas, on August 19, 1881, she was eleven years old when her parents moved to a claim near Cushing. She remembered attending Sunday School in a sod building. Several years later her father opened a drug business in Cushing and they moved to town. Cushing was a frontier town at that time and she recalled the times when the Dalton Brothers would come to her father's house in the middle of the night to get medicine.

A year after they were married, John and Belle returned to lowa and started farming on 80 acres 5½ miles west of Lenox. In the following years, John expanded his farming operation as well as becoming a buyer and shipper of livestock. In 1910 the family moved into Lenox. John continued to devote much of his time to the buying of livestock and often as many as 25 railroad cars of cattle and hogs would be shipped out in a week. Belle was an avid reader and never ceased to improve her understanding of the Bible and of national and international in them this desire to broaden her ್ಲedge. She was a member and Past Matron of the Order of Eastern Star anda 50-year member of the Fortnightly Club and the Methodist Church.

### LOUIS AND LULU WALTER

Louis Noah Walter was born October 24, 1880 in Mercer Township, Adams County, Iowa to Henri and Louisa Schafroth Walter who came to this country from Switzerland when they were children.

Louie grew up on the farm, receiving education in the one-room school nearby. He never attended high school but expanded his education through observation and experience — "The School of Hard Knocks." Raising grain and feeding livestock was his mainstay, the foundation for this being laid by his father and older brothers.

In his time, he was progressive and expanded owning the first tractor and plow in the area. He purchased one of the first automobiles and in his later years had probably driven a car longer than anyone around. His mechanical ability served him well on the farm.

In 1903 he married Lulu Blanch Ely, born October 27, 1884 to Charles and Ada Ely. His parents moved to Lenox and the young couple set up housekeeping on the farm. There five children were born, Clifford Lee, 1904, Ethel Ada, 1906, and twin sons and a daughter who died in infancy.

About 1913 they moved to Lenox but Louie continued to operate the farm and some land in Taylor County. They made many trips to California, seeking medical aid for Clifford who had been injured in a fall from the haymow. They traveled by automobile on roads that changed with every rainstorm, and camped alongside the road wherever they were when night fell. They lived in California from time to time where their son, Julian Louis, was born in Long Beach, 1920.

Ethel sailed to Manila, Philippines to marry her fiance, Bill Grant, who was employed there. They later lived in Long Beach where she passed away in 1976. Cliff returned to Lenox for several years and was bookkeeper at Copeland Wells Creamery. He married Gretchen Copeland and they later moved to California where he died in 1950.

In 1932 the great depression brought Louie and Lulu back to the farm. These were hard times, but they managed to weather the storm.

Julian married Josephine Beach in 1940 and once more the parents moved to Lenox and the newlyweds started their home on the farm. This young couple was to live there and operate the farm longer than any preceding generation, seeing it become a "Century Farm" in 1972.

During their married life of almost 65 years, Louie and Lulu had many ups and downs, joys and sorrows. During their final years, they and Bell SWatterlave Mesting that (Geneta) Mediate Me climates and generally reaping the harvest of a long, hardworking lifetime.

As a young man, he grew up on the farm and spent many of his days helping drive livestock to town from surrounding farms for his father, who was a prominent buyer and shipper of livestock. He graduated from Lenox High School and attended Iowa State University.

On May 8, 1926, he was married to Dorothy Wynn of Lenox, daughter of Sherman and Edna (Wilson) Wynn. Born in Prescott, Iowa on October 16, 1903, she lived in Chanute, Kansas as a small girl, returning to lowa while in the sixth grade, also graduating from the Lenox High School. She taught in the surrounding rural schools for four years.

This marriage marked the beginning of almost 50 years of married life and 45 years in business in Lenox. During these years, Orval operated a gasoline and oil business, an implement business, and managed his farm west of Lenox. In the fall of 1960, he was elected State Senator and represented Taylor and Adams County in the 1961-1963 sessions and the special session of 1964. In the 1965-1967 session, he served as assistant law clerk of the Senate.

Both were active in community affairs. They were long-time members of the Order of Eastern Star and of the First Christian Church, where Orval served as treasurer for 15 years and elder for 20 years. He served two terms on the Lenox City Council and Lenox School Board and was a member of Rotary International. He was a 50-year member of the Masonic Lodge, a member of the ZA-GA-ZIG Shrine of Des Moines and a 50-year member of the Iowa State Alumni Association from which he received a special community service award. Dorothy was a charter member of the Lenox H.S. Club and of the Legislative Ladies League of Iowa.

In 1900 George and Lauretta Walters and two small children, Iva and Wesley (my father), came to Taylor County, Iowa from Nebraska. Grandma was always called Ett by her family and friends. Two years later Eva was born.

They rented various farms in the Guss community, then bought a farm in Guss. Their only mode of travel was a team of horses and a buggy.

Wesley helped his father with the farming. He also worked at the Guss store and drove a delivery truck from Guss to Clarinda, hauling

cream, eggs, and poultry. He also hauled freight to and from Nodaway. On June 6, 1923 he married Violet Gray, the

girl across the road. They were married at the home of Rev. Carpenter, who lived only a half mile from Guss. Their first home was a mile and quarter from Guss, where they lived one year. The next year they moved to Guss where Violet's parents had lived and across the road from Wesley's parents. They rented this farm and later purchased it from Tom Wright. They

I (Maxine) was born here. I attended Weston school in Nodaway Township for eight years. I rode a pony the two miles, weather permitting. My dad and other fathers built a little shed at the school where we could tie our ponies during the day. When it was cold and deep snow, my father would take me to school with horses and bobsled. We picked up other kids along the way. This was fun.

Twelve years later my brother, Ronald, was born. He also attended this same school and went horseback.

Lattended Villisca High School. My freshman year I rode to school with a neighbor boy and three other passengers. In 1940 the school bus started. My cousin, Don Gray, was the driver. With no gravel roads this was quite a feat.

My father farmed with horses until 1945 when he purchased his first tractor.
