Fred L. Johnson was educator for 45 years

Death came Wednesday,
Nov. 25, to Fred L. Johnson,
prominent Fremont County
educator and former Iowa
state representative. He was
75 years old.

Born in Lincoln, Nebr., he
spent his entire life in this
area except for short teaching
assignments at Lincoln and in
Montana.

In addition to teaching and
principal duties in the Ham-
burg school system for almost
25 years, he also taught at
Randolph and Sidney, and was
superintendent at Riverton
five years. In all, his career
in education spanned 45 years.

His deep interest in politics
led to his election to the Iowa
House of Representatives for
two terms, until failing health
forced his retirement from
public life in 1959.

He graduated from the U.
of Iowa in 1911 with a B. A.
degree, and was granted a
Master's Degree from the U.
of Nebraska in 1939. His the-
sis was instrumental in bring-
ing about reciprocity laws
which allow Nebraska and Mis-
souri students living close to
Iowa schools to attend them at
the same rate as Iowa students.

He was a past secretary of
the Hamburg Kiwanis Club,
was a member of IOOF 197;
AF&AM 253; and RAM 76.

Burial was in Hamburg
Cemetery following 2:00 p. m.
services at the Johnson Funer-
al Home Friday, Nov. 27.

Survivors include his wife
Grace, and four children:
Frederic of Hamburg; James
of Tabor; Gerald of Flint,
Mich.; and Mrs. Elizabeth
Smith of Maryville, Mo. Two
brothers, Oral and Orville,
both of Hamburg, survive, in
addition to 12 grandchildren.

Major ballots not counted.

Brown alleges that in Madi-
son Township, his home town-
ship, judges and clerks on the
receiving and counting boards
were seated in error.

In addition, the petition
charges that the official vote
canvass by the Fremont Coun-
ty board of supervisors was
illegal in that counting of the
votes was started prior to the
12 o'clock noon time specified
by law.

Mr. Scoles and Mr. Brown
and their attorneys will now
each select one judge. Normal-
ly these two, along with the
chairman of the board of super-
isors, comprise the contest
board. However, since the board
chairman is Mr. Scoles, the
next supervisor with most ex-
perience, Steve Scott, will serve
on the contest board.

Brown has selected Robert
Cloepfil as his judge, and
Scoles has picked Ed Eaton of
Sidney.

It is thought now that count-
ing of the ballots will get un-
derway Friday, Dec. 11, and
should not take more than a
day.

Only that portion of the bal-
lot involved in the contest will
be checked, and about a thous-
and ballots are involved. The
unusual number of straight
tickets cast with a "scratch"
vote here and there for indi-
vidual candidates of the other
party will probably figure
prominently in the re-count.

The ballots have not been
opened since they were placed
in envelopes and sealed by the
various counting boards im-
mediately after counting the
night of Nov. 3. They now res-
ide in the vault of the county audi-
tor. The official vote canvass
of Nov. 9 re-counted only the
official tally on the outside of
the envelopes. No one has seen
the actual ballots since they
were counted by the individual
boards.
