Recycling Center is scheduled to open in October. Its operation will coincide with the start of weekly curbside collection of recyclables. Construction of the recycling center was driven by state mandates that require cities to recycle at least 25 percent of waste collected. Curbside pickup — which will be voluntary — is projected to raise recycling from 14 percent to 26 percent. Councilman Loren Callendar, who cast the lone vote against the rate increase Monday, again argued that the city could have met the

state requirements without building a recycling center. "I felt strongly we should have waited," Callendar said. But other council members said the city has a responsibility to deal with an issue the public cares deeply about. "We have an obligation to recycle," Councilman Harry Keairns said. "We owe it to our

Former U.S. Senator Jack Miller dies at 78

Sioux Cityan served 2 terms in Senate

Former U.S. Sen. Jack Miller, formerly from Sioux City, died Monday at a retirement home in Temple Terrace, Fla., after suffering a heart attack.

He was 78.

Miller, a conservative Republican, sat on the U.S. Court of Customs and Patent Appeals in Washington, D.C. after he was defeated in his bid for a third term to the Senate in 1972. He retired from the bench in 1982.

In 1960 Miller, then an Iowa state senator, ran as an underdog against Gov. Herschel Loveless for the U.S. Senate — and won. He served in elective office for

a total of 17 years at the state and national levels.

He won re-election to the Senate in 1966, carrying every county. He ran up the second-highest Senate plurality in Iowa history.

He announced his campaign for re-election in 1972 by walking into the Associated Press office and asking to borrow a typewriter. He typed up his own press release, handed it to a desk editor and walked out the door.

He was defeated in that election by Democrat Dick Clark, who was considered an underdog. Clark campaigned by walking across the state.

In 1973, President Richard Nixon nominated Miller as an associate judge of the U.S. Court of Customs and Patent Appeals. The Senate confirmed his appointment. Miller said at the time he was the first Iowan to serve on the court, which was established in 1912. The court was based in Washington.

In October 1982, the U.S. Court of Customs and Appeals merged with the U.S. Court of Claims to form the Federal Circuit.

During his Senate career, Miller once said he was the "father" of automatic cost-of-living increases in Social Security benefits. He said he pushed for the provision for years and got it inserted into the Republican Party platform at the 1968 Republican National Convention. Congress passed the cost-of-living plan in 1972.

While in the Senate, Miller offered an amendment providing for a minimum income tax on individual taxpayers. The amendment was adopted and became part of the Tax Reform Act of 1969.

Miller was the ranking Republican on the Agriculture Committee and third ranking on the Finance Committee in the Senate. He also served on the Senate Armed Services Committee

Known as a fiscal conservative, Miller often was at odds with Democratic administration economic policies, but voted for civil rights bills and conservation measures and

kids to recycle."

"For everyone who's opposed to paying more, there is an equal number who are concerned about recycling," Scott said.

Scott said he earlier met with Utilities Director Steve Hoambrecker and Solid Waste Systems Manager John Green for more than 1 1/2 hours to scale back the proposed rate increase.

Staff will try to cut expenses, as well as plug in "more realistic" revenue projections, Scott said. The city-run center is soliciting

recyclables from surrounding cities and counties, which would shoulder part of operating and capital costs. Scott said he believes such revenues will be higher than currently budgeted.

The council postponed a vote Monday on the proposed \$566,979 recycling center budget that covers the balance of the current fiscal year.

In addition to recycling, the proposed garbage fee increase will cover increased costs of operating the landfill — driven by new environmental mandates — and to pay part of a \$2.5 million out-of-court settlement the city recently awarded to an Elk Point, S.D., man. supported the United Nations.

In 1972, he received the first Distinguished Service Award of the national Water Resources Congress.

Miller was born June 6, 1916, in Chicago. He moved with his parents to Sioux City in 1932. His parents originally were from Wood River, Neb. He received his undergraduate degree from Creighton University in 1938.

During World War II, he served in the Air Force in the China-Burma-India theater and taught logistics at the Army Command and Staff College, attaining the rank of lieutenant colonel. He retired from the Air Force Reserve as a brigadier general.

Following the war he received his law degree from Columbia University in New York. He also took post-graduate work at the University of Iowa College of Law.

He worked in the office of the

chief counsel of the Internal Revenue Service in Washington in 1947 and 1948, while teaching law at George Washington University. He taught at the Notre Dame law school from then until 1949, when he returned to Sioux City to practice law. From 1949 to 1960, Miller ran a private tax law practice in Sioux City.

Miller began his political career in 1955 when he was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives, representing Woodbury County. He served two years. He was elected to a four-year term in the Iowa Senate, where he served from 1957 through 1960 when he ran as the Republican nominee for U.S. Senate.

He married the former Isabelle "Jerry" Browning of Windber, Penn., in 1942.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by one son, Jim; three daughters, Janice, Judy and Jaynie; 11 grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.



MILLER, Jacob Welsh, a Senator from New Jersey; born in German Valley, Morris County, N.J., August 29, 1800; attended the public schools; studied law; was admitted to the bar in 1823 and practiced in Morristown, N.J.; elected to the State general assembly in 1832; served in the State council 1838-1840; elected as a Whig to the United States Senate in 1840; reelected in 1846 and served from March 4, 1841, to March 3, 1853; chairman, Committee on the District of Columbia (Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth Congresses); died in Morristown, N.J., September 30, 1862; interment in St. Peter's Parish Churchyard.

MILLER, James Francis, a Representative from Texas; born in Winnsboro, Fairfield District, S.C., August 1, 1830; moved with his parents to Texas in 1842; attended the common schools and Reutersville College; studied law; was admitted to the bar in 1857 and commenced practice in Gonzales, Tex.; enlisted as a private in Company I, Eighth Texas Cavalry, better known as "Terry's Texas Rangers," and served throughout the Civil War; resumed the practice of law in Gonzales, Tex.; engaged in banking and stock raising; elected as a Democrat to the Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth Congresses (March 4, 1883-March 3, 1887); chairman, Committee on Banking and Currency (Forty-ninth Congress); declined renomination; resumed former pursuits; elected as first president of the Texas Bankers' Association in 1885; died in Gonzales, Tex., on July 3, 1902; interment in Masonic Cemetery.

MILLER, James Monroe, a Representative from Kansas; born at Three Springs, Huntingdon County, Pa., May 6, 1852; attended the district school and was graduated from Dickinson Seminary, Williamsport, Pa., in 1875; moved to

Skiddy, Morris County, Kans., in 1875; superintendent of schools in Council Grove, Kans., for two terms, and while holding this position studied law; was admitted to the bar in 1879 and commenced practice in Council Grove, Kans.; elected prosecuting attorney of Morris County, Kans., in 1880 and again in 1884 and 1886; member of the State house of representatives in 1894 and 1895; elected as a Republican to the Fifty-sixth and to the five succeeding Congresses (March 4, 1899-March 3, 1911); chairman, Committee on Claims (Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth Congresses), Committee on Elections No. 2 (Sixty-first Congress); unsuccessful candidate for renomination in 1910; resumed the practice of law in Council Grove, Morris County, Kans., and died there January 20, 1926; interment in Greenwood Cemetery.

MILLER, Jesse (father of William Henry Miller), a Representative from Pennsylvania; born near Landisburg, Perry County, Pa., in 1800; attended the common schools; first clerk to county commissioner of Perry County 1820-1823; sheriff of Perry County 1823-1826; member of the State house of representatives from 1826 until February 7, 1828, when he resigned; served in the State senate 1828-1832; elected as a Jacksonian to the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Congresses and served from March 4, 1833, until his resignation on October 30, 1836; chairman, Committee on Invalid Pensions (Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Congresses); First Auditor of the Treasury Department, by appointment of President Jackson, 1836-1842; canal commissioner of Pennsylvania in 1844 and 1845; secretary of state of Pennsylvania 1845-1848; died in Harrisburg, Pa., August 20, 1850; interment in Harrisburg Cemetery.

MILLER, John, a Representative from New York; born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N.Y., November 10, 1774; attended the district school one year and a private classical school in Kent, Conn., for a like period; studied medicine in the University of Pennsylvania at Philadelphia and commenced practice in Washington County, N.Y., in 1798; moved to Fabius, Onondaga County (now Truxton, Cortland County), N.Y., in 1801; coroner of Cortland County in 1802; postmaster of Truxton 1805-1825; organized the Cortland County Medical Society, and in 1808 was its first vice president; justice of the peace 1812-1821; member of the State assembly in 1817, 1820, and 1845; judge of the county court 1817-1820; elected to the Nineteenth Congress (March 4, 1825-March 3, 1827); delegate to the State constitutional convention in 1846; died in Truxton, Cortland County, N.Y., March 31, 1862; interment in the City Cemetery.

MILLER, John, a Representative from Missouri; born near Martinsburg, Berkeley County, Va. (now West Virginia), November 25, 1781; attended the common schools; moved to Steubenville, Ohio, about 1803 and published the *Western Herald and Steubenville Gazette*; served in the War of 1812 as lieutenant colonel of the Seventeenth United States Infantry and as colonel in command of the Nineteenth Infantry; resigned his Army commission February 10, 1818; was appointed register of the land office at Franklin, Howard County, Mo., which position he held for eight years; elected Governor of Missouri to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Governor Bates; reelected and served from 1825 to 1832; elected as a Democrat to the Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth, and Twenty-seventh Congresses (March 4, 1837-March 3, 1843); declined to be a candidate for renomination in 1842, and retired to his residence near Florissant, Mo., where he died March 18, 1846; interment in Col. John O'Fallon's private vault on the O'Fallon farm; reinterment in Bellefontaine Cemetery, St. Louis, Mo.




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
