Heart Attack Is Fatal to Lund, 66

Conduct Last Services for Community Leader

Services were Monday afternoon at the Roland funeral home in Corning for Albert Lund, 66, of Brooks, prominent community leader. Mr. Lund died suddenly Friday noon after suffering a heart attack.

Mr. Lund was a former state representative from Adams county in the Iowa legislature and was active in state and national affairs of rural electrification.

At the time of his death he was serving a third term as state president of the Iowa Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives and as vice-president of the Adams County Cooperative Electric Co.

He also was a member of the board of the Southwest Federated of Creston.

Five-Person Board Appointed by City For Handling Details

Appointment of a five-person housing authority, to administer the low-rent housing project approved by Corning voters last month, was made during the regular council meeting here Wednesday night, Dec. 4.

Named to the authority or board and terms were: Harry Coulter and Millard Vance, three years; Mrs. Thelma Heitsman and Lee R. Watts, two years; and Bernard E. Miller, one year.

The issue, first approved in the state of Iowa, received overwhelming support from the voters of Corning, as the proposition carried by a majority of 85 per cent. The vote was 406-68.

The housing project, for persons over 62 years of age, able to care for themselves and with limited income and assets, will be financed entirely by the federal government.

A letter of intent already has been signed with the architect and engineering firm of Arter and Speece of Lincoln, Nebr. in connection with getting the project under way.

The five-person authority or board will work closely with federal officials in planning and developing the housing project, in regard to such details as size, site, construction, contracts, etc.

No city money or tax funds will be involved in the project. Cost of the housing will be financed by revenue bonds.

The bonds are supported by the rents received from the tenants in the project—plus the commitment of the federal government in an annual contributions contract to make up the difference between the amount collected from tenants and the total expenses of the project, including rent and amortization.
