Services Held For Mahlon Brown, Former Legislator

Mahlon N. Brown, former What Cheer attorney who was state representative from Keokuk county for three terms from 1953 until 1958, died Thursday at Washington, D. C., after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage. Funeral services for Brown, 41, were at Washington Monday, and burial was at Arlington National cemetery. He died at Walter Reed Army hospital after becoming ill at his home in Cheverly, Maryland.

Brown served in World War II as an Army Air Corps pilot. He received his law degree from the University of Iowa in 1950.

A native of What Cheer, he practiced law there, and was elected to three terms in the Iowa legislature on the Republican ticket.

He joined the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization in 1958, and was in Battle Creek, Michigan until being transferred to Washington in 1961. The office was changed to the Office of Emergency Planning, and he worked as a disaster operations planning officer, and specialist in continuity of government.

He was a member of the What Cheer Masonic lodge.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Pamela and Sally; his mother, Mrs. Dewayne Brown of Jefferson; and a brother, Robert of Lytton.
