# Postal Service Estimates Huge Loss To Public

American consumers lost an estimated \$514 million last year as a result of mail fraud and misrepresentation by mail schemes, according to Officer in Charge Ed Huebner.

Accounting for most of the loss are schemes involving stocks and investments, credit misrepresentation, and false claims by insurance companies.

In a concerted effort to assist consumers, Postmaster General William F. Bailer has designated January 21-26 as the second National Postal Consumer Protection Week. This week is designed to bring the public to mail order schemes and serves to emphasize consumer protection activities by the Postal Service," Huebner said. "The Postal Service has been educating consumers since enactment in 1872 of the Mail Fraud Act."

Investment schemes ranked first in dollar value, with a loss to the public of \$44,524,240. Failure to return merchandise ranked first in number of complaints received with more than 19,000 reported, resulting in a loss of \$2,645,326.

Huebner stressed that the overwhelming majority of those complaining about the \$60 billion mail order industry are honest and want to satisfy their customers. As in other industries, there are a few disreputable ones that cause problems.

The Postal Service actively investigates mail fraud and false representation by mail, and assists with mail order and service problems through the efforts of the Postal Service Law Department, the Service's Judicial Office and its Consumer Advocate.

Consumer protection activities of these departments include attempts to resolve unsatisfactory mail order transactions such as failure to furnish ordered merchandise or make promised refunds. Administrative proceedings may be initiated against mail order schemes that falsely advertise their products.

He died at his home February 16, 1977 at the age of 80 years, 2 months and 16 days.

Mr. Holdsworth was a member of Abu Bekr Temple, Sioux City; Scottish Rite Bodies, Sioux City; Golden Leaf Lodge 595, Manilla; American Legion and past commander of Manilla; V.F.W., Denison; the Manilla Presbyterian Church where he served as an elder. He was State Representative for Crawford County for two terms, 1955 and 1957.

He was preceded in death by his parents and two sisters.

Survivors include his wife Margaret and children: Harold of Manilla; Robert of Denison; Dorothy, Mrs. William Ballintine of Ft. Meyers, Fla., Raymond of Manilla; Darlene, Mrs. Lawrence Johnson of Oklahoma City, Okla.; 12 grandchildren, two great grandchildren; two brothers, Ray of Manilla and Lee of Iowa Falls; one sister, Mrs. Mae Stein of Cedar Rapids and three half sisters.
