MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Otto Armstrong, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Otto Armstrong was born January 4, 1880, near Atlanta, Missouri. He attended local school and later graduated from Ottumwa Commercial College.

In 1903 he married Katherine Casada of Fairfield, who passed away in 1941. They had two daughters and one son. In 1942 he married Clare Hale of Ottumwa, and they farmed near Ottumwa.

Mr. Armstrong was a member of the Farm Bureau, with eight years service on the board of directors. He was also chairman of the Wapello County Ration Board. He was past exalted ruler and life member of the Elks and past president of the Kiwanis Club. He was active in Masonic reders, including life member Kaaba Shrine. He was on the board of disctors of the Chamber of Commerce, and chairman of Wapello County oldiers Relief Commission for twenty years. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War. Mr. Armstrong was a member of the Baptist Church.

Mr. Armstrong served in the House of Representatives during the session of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly.

He passed away June 23, 1960, at Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Surviving him are his widow, Clare, Ottumwa; a daughter, Mrs. Virginia Flanders, Ottumwa; a daughter, Mrs. Mary Jordan, Batavia, and a son, Robert E. Armstrong, Livermore, California. Also, one brother, Roy E. Armstrong, Jacksonville, Texas.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fiftyninth General Assembly of Iowa: That in the passing of the Honorable Otto Armstrong the state has lost an honored citizen and a faithful and useful public servant, and the House by this resolution would express its appreciation of his service, and tender its sympathy to the members of his family.
