- In 1921 with J. H. Bettendorf and Reed Lane, they purchased the Federal Bake Shops, Inc. which was a chain of bakeries in Omaha, Nebraska which they sold in 1929

nounced Saturday he will go  
to Vietnam next month with a  
group headed by Rep. Fred  
Schwengel, R-Iowa.

Schwengel is a member of  
the Calvary Baptist congrega-  
tion.

The Rev. Mr. Grabia has  
been assigned to the Religion  
and Servicemen Abroad Com-  
mittees of the entourage  
which will leave from San  
Francisco Nov. 16 and spend  
about two weeks in Vietnam.

Other study committees are  
being assigned to political  
problems, military, agricul-  
ture, and the pacification pro-  
gram.

Mr. Grabia said the invita-  
tion to join the group was "a  
once in a lifetime  
opportunity... and a distinct  
honor."

He plans to address troops  
stationed in Vietnam and  
meet with Army chaplains  
while in Saigon. He will have  
Thanksgiving Day dinner in  
the private's mess hall.

"As we anticipate this trip  
to Vietnam," Mrs. Grabia said,

## Former Scott Legislator, Hedin, Dies

Philip T. Hedin, 85, retired  
Davenport realtor and former  
Scott County legislator and su-  
pervisor, died Saturday after-  
noon at Mercy Hospital. He  
had been in failing health for  
two years.

Services will be Tuesday  
2:30 p.m. in St. Mark's Lu-  
theran Church. Entombment  
will be in Fairmount Mau-  
soleum.

Visitation will be after 2  
p.m. today until 11 a.m. Tues-  
day at the Runge Mortuary.

Mr. Hedin, a lifelong Re-  
publican, served three terms  
in the Iowa House of Repre-  
sentatives from 1942 to 1948,  
and one term in the Senate  
from 1950 to 1954.

He was appointed to the  
Scott County Board of Super-  
visors in 1957 to fill the unex-  
pired term of Richard E. En-  
glehart. He was elected to a  
full term in 1962.

Mr. Hedin retired from poli-  
tics and the real estate busi-

He and his wife moved into Ridgecrest Retirement Village last Jan. 5. They observed their 56th wedding anniversary Sept. 9.

Mr. Hedin was born Oct. 11, 1882, in Moline. He graduated from Moline High School where he was captain of the 1904 football team that was not scored on during the entire season. He graduated from the Minneapolis Business College and attended the University of Minnesota.

## Bank Employee

He began his career as an employe of the First National Bank in Minneapolis. He returned to Moline to accept a position as head of the savings department of the People's Savings Bank and Trust Co.

Mr. Hedin made his debut in politics by winning election as city treasurer of Moline.

He later moved to Davenport as assistant purchasing agent of the old Bettendorf Co.

## Bakery Chain

In 1921, Mr. Hedin, J. W. Bettendorf and Reed Lane, bought the Federal Bake Shops Inc., chain of bakeries in Omaha which they sold in 1929.

Mr. Lane took over management of Wardman Properties, Washington, D.C., and Mr. Hedin accepted a position with Mr. Lane as general manager of apartments.

Two years later Mr. Hedin returned to Davenport as a salesman for the Art Wagner Realty Co. He later joined the Davenport Board of Realtors and operated his own business, Hedin Realty Co. at 821 W. Locust St. until he retired.

On Sept. 9, 1911, Mr. Hedin married Hilda Reimers in Davenport. A son and daughter died in infancy.

Mr. Hedin is survived by his wife and a nephew, Melvin Johnson, Moline.

## Real 'Cool' Jobs Offer \$13,000!

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Weather Bureau hung its help wanted sign out Saturday for jobs paying up to \$13,700 and added free meals, lodgings and recreation as added inducements.

But there's a hitch.


The jobs are located in the Arctic where nights are 24 hours long and outside temperatures remain far below zero. The job holders will live in isolation for from 6 to 13 months in Northern Canada manning five stations in the bureau's Arctic network.

And each applicant must be qualified as a cook, meteorological technician, mechanic or electronic technician.

The Weather Bureau said it's a good opportunity to save some money since there's little to spend money on at the five stations.

Annual pay ranges from \$7,068 for a cook to \$10,927 for the top meteorological technician. But there's also an Arctic bonus of \$200 a month plus another \$100 during the winter night months.

Assignments will begin next spring.
