Former Journal Editor Passes Away Sunday

Frank Koch, 73, for 28 years from 1919 to 1947 editor of the West Bend Journal, passed away at the Spencer hospital Sunday morning at 9:30. He had been in poor health for some time but had been hospitalized only 10 days.

Services were held Tuesday afternoon in the First Methodist Church with the Rev. Floyd Hinshaw of Spencer officiating. with Bogaard Funeral home in charge.

Masons and Eastern Star members attended in a body with Masonic rites at the grave.

Mr. Koch served two terms in the State Legislature as Representative from Palo Alto County. He was a life-long resident of Whittemore and West Bend.

He is survived by his wife Mae one son Richard of Lincoln, Nebr., two daughters, Barbara, Mrs. Chris Stauch of



Kimball, Nebr., and Kathryn, a student at Iowa State college in Ames.

Funeral services for Frank Koch, 73, who passed away December 28, were held on Tuesday December 30 at 2:00 P.M. at the First Methodist Church in West Bend with Rev. Floyd Henshaw of Spencer officiating. Masonic rites were conducted by Templar Lodge No. 514 A.F. and A.M. of West Bend. Diana Sabo sang "O Rest In The Lord" and a duet "In the Garden" was sung by Diana and Janet Sabo of Gilmore City friends of the family. Accompanist was Stephen B. Williams. Casket bearers were Wm. Interment was in the West Bend Cemetery with the Bogaard Funeral Home in charge.

Frank Koch was born on a farm near Whittemore November 15, 1885 and passed away December 28, 1958 in the Spencer Hospital. He was the fourth child of a family of eight boys and four girls born to John Koch and his wife, Josephine Kindle Koch.

He learned the printing trade at The Whittemore Champion Office while attending school. After graduation he was employed on newspapers at Woodbine, Algona, Garner, Clarion, Emmetsburg and Loveland, Colorado. He was employed for ten years (1909-1919) by W. I. Branagan on the Emmetsburg Democrat as foreman of the shop, coming to West Bend as publisher and editor of the West Bend Journal in 1919. He continued in the latter capacity until January of 1947. During that year he sold his publishing interests to the present editor and was elected State Representative from Palo Alto County. He served three terms in the General Assembly in Des Moines.

On January 29, 1927 he was united in marriage with May Schlichtemier of Nehawka, Nebraska. Three children were born to this union; Barbara

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Besides his immediate family, he is survived by four grandchildren; three brothers and three sisters, Art of Chicago, Walter of Mitchell, South Dakota, LeRoy of Austin, Minnesota, Carrie (Mrs. Fred Rasmussen) of Cherokee, Agnes (Mrs. William Weir) of Emmetsburg and Viola (Mrs. Raymond Newby) of Dennison, Texas, several nieces and nephews. Besides his parents, he was preceded in death by two brothers and one sister who died in infancy, a brother George during World War I and a brother Ed, Humboldt, during 1955.

Frank was interested in his community, state and nation. He was a faithful member of the First Methodist Church; Templar Lodge No. 514 A.F. and A.M. (1921); The Commandery (Emmetsburg, 1923); Patron of the Order of Eastern Star for fifteen years. He served on the West Bend School Board of fifteen years, eight years as President.

In his younger days he was a semi-pro baseball player and had a great interest in sports of various kinds. Whenever there was worthwhile task in the community to be done, Frank could always be counted on to make his full contribution.

On Tuesday, December 30, in the First Methodist church at West Bend, Frank Koch, 73, was buried, with Rev. Floyd Hinshaw officiating at the services of Masonic rites. Burial was in the West Bend cemetery.

Mr. Koch was born November 15, 1885, near Whittemore and was learning the printing trade at the Whittemore Champion office while attending school. After graduation he was employed on newspapers in several different towns and from 1909 to 1919 he was foreman of the shop at the Emmetsburg Democrat and then to West Bend as publisher and editor of the West Bend Journal in 1919 and continued until January, 1947.

In 1947 he was elected state representative from Palo Alto county and served three terms in the General Assembly in Des Moines.

On June 29, 1929, he married May Schlichtemier at Nehawka, Nebraska, who survives, as also do three children.
