Hughes and Marvin Selden Jr., state comptroller, said they now expect the general fund surplus—money left over after all bills are paid—at the end of the current biennium to be \$30.2 million.

Selden had told the 1965 legislature he expected this figure to be about \$12 million.

It means that instead of spending about \$18 million from the \$33.4 million surplus that existed last June 30, the state will spend only about \$3 million.

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In effect, the state finds more money in its treasury than it expected.

Hughes said the extra money will be available for future legislatures to use.

Selden said much of the additional income is from corporate and personal income taxes, occurring because individuals and businesses are earning more and because of an estimated six per cent general economic growth.

Receipts for the biennium ended June 30, 1965 averaged \$217 million a year. For the current biennium, Selden estimates increases to bring average income to \$264.3 million.

He said the major anticipated boosts include \$12.3 million from increases or extensions of existing taxes; \$12.3 million from economic growth; \$17.2 million windfall from withholding of state income taxes and monthly instead of quarterly reporting of sales taxes; \$2.3 million to come from counties because of increased amounts they will pay the State Board of Control for care of inmates in institutions; \$1 million in liquor profits; \$1.7 million in license and fee increases, mainly for the driver's license; and \$500,000 from miscellaneous state fees.

Death Claims Soren S. Kudsk, Businessman

Soren Sorensen Kudsk, 73, assistant cashier at the Commercial Savings Bank, died Thursday afternoon at his home, 1738 Terrace Drive, Carroll, as result of a heart ailment.

A resident of Carroll since 1926, he was the first manager of the J. C. Penney Company store here and a former state representative.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Monday in the First Presbyterian Church at Carroll, conducted by the Rev. Allan M. Peterson. Burial will be in the family lot in the Carroll City Cemetery. Friends may call at the Huffman Funeral Home in Carroll after 7 p.m. Friday.

4th Day of Terrorism in Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — A teen-age terrorist tossed a grenade into a truck-load of U.S. soldiers in Saigon today, injuring 12 GIs.

It was Saigon's fourth straight day of terrorism marking the fifth anniversary Monday of the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front.

The would-be assassin, about 15 or 16, fled in the confusion on the busy street. Only one of the Americans was seriously injured.

In North Viet Nam, Communist MIGs took to the air—but cautiously — during another day of heavy bombardment.

American pilots reported sighting seven Soviet-built MIG17s which kept a discreet distance while apparently trailing the U.S. jets. An Air Force spokesman said the American planes were too short on fuel to take on the Communist jets.

Two U.S. planes were lost in other operations.

A Navy jet returning from a mission over North Viet Nam crashed into the ramp of the flight deck of the carrier Kitty Hawk and plunged into the sea. The pilot was presumed dead.

Enemy ground fire apparently nailed an Air Force F5 Freedom fighter jet which crashed on an attack mission 15 miles from Saigon. An Army helicopter picked up the injured pilot but he died later.

In the ground war, a Viet Cong battalion badly mauled a government company 22 miles northwest of the capital, inflicting heavy casualties. The Reds

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Pleads Guilty of Embezzling

DES MOINES (AP)—Robert R. Dyer, 45, former Des Moines city employe, pleaded guilty Friday in District Court of embezzling \$13,200 in city urban renewal funds.

Judge Wade Clarke granted Dyer's request for a presentence investigation by probation officers and set sentencing for Dec. 30.

Dyer entered his plea to a county attorney's information charging him with embezzlement by a public officer.

The charge calls for a prison sentence of up to 10 years, plus a fine equal to the amount of money embezzled.

After entering the plea, Dyer was released on \$2,500 bond.

Dyer's attorney, Bernard Connolly, said the money taken represented payments for rental of an unsold River Hills urban renewal parcel, plus a small amount of "unexplained shortages."

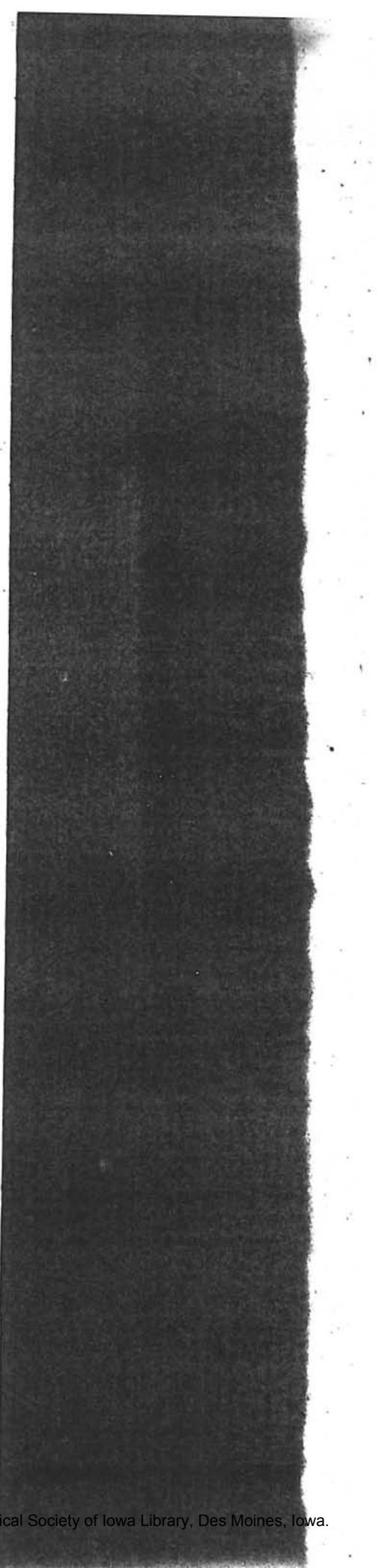
