be annexed to the city of Salinas.

Recently, another letter reminding the school board of the city planning commission's stand was sent, Mr. Dunne said.

"The letter was read and filed by the board, and the information we got back was to the effect the board would file plans with the city after they are adopted by the school board," Mr. Dunne said.

He said he has suggested meetings with the board and has asked many questions of the school administration. "They delay answering these questions and, meanwhile, go on making plans the way they see fit," he said.

Not Opposed to Site

Mr. Dunne said the city has no quarrel with selection of the site, or where the school board places the main building, just so long as the board understands the city's position.

The city's position is, basically, that the school site is subject to the same planning restrictions as any residential or industrial subdivision.

Mr. Dunne said that even though the area is outside the city limits, the state planning act states the school board must conform to city planning if the area is designated a precise plan area.

He said this has not yet been done because it was hoped the problems could be solved by cooperation between the school and city authorities.

John M. Tudor, 70, Iowa Cattleman, Dies in Hospital

John Milton Tudor, 70, retired Carmel Valley resident, passed away in a Salinas hospital last night after a short illness. He was a well-known

resident of the state of Iowa, once served as senator there from the 23rd district, and came here to retire because of ill health two years ago. He was a native of Iowa City.

Mr. Tudor was a prominent breeder of Aberdeen Angus cattle in his native state for more than 40 years, having established the Glyn Mawr herd of Angus. He had judged livestock at shows throughout the nation. For 12 years he served as a member of the board of directors, American Angus Cattle association, and at one time was its president.

Fraternally he was a member of Iowa City lodge, F&A Masons; Kaaba temple of Shrine in Davenport, Ia.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Grace Tudor, of the family home at 22 La Rancherio, Carmel Valley; one son, Dr. John M. Tudor, Nashville, Tenn.; three daughters, Mrs. Eugene Eldridge, Salinas; Mrs. Paul Jacobs, Sioux City, Ia., and Mrs. Otto A. Will, Washington, D. C.; three sisters, Miss Gwen Tudor, San Leandro; Mrs. George Gallagher, Harlington, Texas, and Mrs. Cyril Attwood, Oakland, and 12 grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Thursday, 2 p. m., in Struve and Laporte's chapel, followed by interment in the Garden of Memories.

Laboratory Pulls Out of Monterey

Satellite - Kennedy, Inc., a subsidiary of the D. S. Kennedy company of Cohasset, Mass., yesterday dissolved plans to build a radar laboratory in the Toyon Heights area of Monterey.

Maj. Gen. E. K. Wright (USA-Ret.) executive vice-president of Monterey County Industrial Development, Inc., which has been assisting in a site search, said, however, the change in plans did not necessarily mean the firm would not locate elsewhere in Monterey county.

The MCID official said he had been requested to "take actions toward surveying other sites previously of interest" to the Kennedy firm. Among these are some along the Salinas-Monterey highway.

"Sincerely Appreciative"

In a telephone conversation with D. S. Kennedy, president, General Wright quoted the official as saying he was "sincerely appreciative" of efforts by various groups and individuals in Monterey to bring the radar laboratory there.

He said Kennedy was also appreciative of the "confidence in the objectives of Satellite-Kennedy shown by the Monterey city planning commission." (City planners last week voted 7-2 to approve rezoning of 22 acres of property belonging to Murray Vout in the Toyon Heights area. County planners, however, recommended denial in view of strong opposition by surrounding

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ing commission. The city manager had been informed of the board's willingness to meet by letter on March 31," Mr. Shock stated. 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Muscatine "Hall Of Fame" Backed By Gov. Loveless

DES MOINES (INS) — Plans for a multi-million dollar "National Agriculture Hall of Fame" at Muscatine have the endorsement of Gov. Herschel Loveless.

The plans were outlined to the chief executive Monday by Muscatine Mayor Walter I. Conway and John K. Suger of Wilton function, president of the National Agriculture Hall of Fame, Inc., a non-profit organization founded to establish the "hall."

They said they plan to solicit contributions from industry, especially those related to agriculture, to finance the building.

The structure would provide a place of honor for the names of persons who have made outstanding contributions to agriculture as well as provide a meeting place for farm groups and a museum to display products, equipment and history of American farming.

Dollar Volume of Farm Exports Down

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farm exports are taking a nosedive in dollar volume. The agriculture department reported Tuesday they declined 29% in February from the same month last year.

Foreign shipments for the 8-month period ending Feb. 28 were down 14% from a year earlier.

Largest reductions were in cotton, wheat, oats, rye, rice, vegetable oils, and animal products including lard.

But more corn, soybeans and flaxseed moved abroad during the 8-month period.

More plentiful supplies in foreign areas coupled with a continued shortage of dollars in importing areas were said to have been major factors in the decline in shipments.

Linn DHIA's List March Production

Linn county DHIA No. 1 led the 3 units in production in March with an average of 954.4 pounds of milk and 37.6 pounds of butterfat, Extension Director Cleon Herriott said Tuesday.

There were 578 cows, 78 dry, in the 22 herds tested by Supervisor J. J. Daly. A total of 20 cows were removed from the herds during the month for production reasons. Two cows were purchased and 17 heifers freshened.

Witwer Holstein farm had the high cow completing her lactation during the month with a production record of 16,670 pounds of milk and 603 pounds of butterfat in 305 days.

Four herds were tested under the owner-sampler plan. A new herd will be added in April, according to Daly's report.

The 639 cows, 88 dry, on test in Linn DHIA No. 2 produced an average of 671.2 pounds of milk and 29.9 pounds of butterfat, Supervisor Cecil Hawarth reported. There were 10 herds in the testing program.

Sixteen cows were removed from the herds during the month. There were 27 cows purchased and 23 heifers freshened.

Linn DHIA No. 3, supervised by Robert Jackson, had a production average of 904 pounds of milk and 35.7 pounds of butterfat. There were 334 cows, 44 dry, in the 14 herds tested.

High cow completing her lactation during the month was in the herd owned by Wallace and Agnes Mills. She produced 15,350 pounds of milk and 635 pounds of butterfat in 305 days.

Eight cows were removed from the herds, 3 cows were purchased and 10 heifers freshened.

Twenty-four herds with 406 cows were tested under the owner-sampler plan. One new herd was added during the month.

Dairymen Advised To Sell Cull Cows Now

URBANA, Ill. — Neither the price outlook for lower grades of beef nor that for dairy products appears to warrant holding unprofitable dairy cows this spring, says J. G. Cash, extension dairy specialist at the University of Illinois.

Culling unprofitable cows will increase earnings and will also take surplus milk off the market, Cash points out.

On most farms it will pay to cull, as unprofitable, cows of the higher testing breeds that produce less than 5,000 pounds of milk a year and cows of the lower testing breeds that produce less than 7,500 pounds.

W. Oliver Turner was born on a farm in Adams County, Iowa, July 12, 1885. He was the son of Archie and Mary Oliver Turner. He attended rural school, Lenox high school, Lenox, Iowa, and one year at Tarkio College, Tarkio, Missouri. On October 12, 1911, he was married to Jennette Murchy.

Mr. Turner was a farmer and breeder of Jersey cattle and Hampshire swine. He was a charter member and past president of the Adams County Farm Bureau. He served as secretary and treasurer of Adams County's first corn sealing board.
