Survived by widow, one son, and one sister.

1930's. He returned to Des Moines in 1955 and successfully sought reelection every two years until 1968. Mr. Duffy became famed for his speeches in the House on St. Patrick's Day, during which he lauded the accomplishments of noted Irishmen.

MEL M. GRAHAM

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character, and public service of the late Honorable Mel M. Graham, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Mel M. Graham was born March 22, 1906, in Primghar, Iowa. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Graham. He graduated from Audubon High School, attended the University of Iowa and received his law degree from Drake University in 1930.

He was married to Naomi Hensley in 1939. To this union two sons, Tony and Ben, were born.

Mr. Graham was a member of the United Methodist Church. He was admitted to the bar in 1930 and joined his father in the practice of law in Audubon. He enlisted in the Army and served in the South Pacific as a master sergeant in World War II and was awarded the Bronze Star for heroism.

He was former county attorney, a member of the library board, Odd Fellows Lodge, Chamber of Commerce, Boy Scouts, Veterans of Foreign Wars and was past commander of the Audubon Legion Post. In 1946, the

Audubon Chamber of Commerce named him the community's "Man of the Year."

Mr. Graham, a Democrat, served as State Representative from Audubon County in the Fifty-second and Fifty-third sessions of the General Assembly of Iowa. In 1949, he resigned to accept an appointment by Governor Charles D. Beardsley to the Highway Commission, which he served for eight years.

Mr. Graham passed away June 27, 1969. Surviving are his widow, Naomi, of Audubon; one son, Ben, of Audubon, and a sister, Mrs. Milton Casne of Omaha. He was preceded in death by one son, Tony.

Oscar N. Hultman was born in Stanton, Iowa, November 2, 1887, of Swedish descent.

Mr. Hultman graduated from Stanton High School and began his business career as a clerk in a general store and later accepted a position as assistant manager of a retail lumber business of which in two years he became the manager, and later the owner. At the time of his death, Mr. Hultman had owned and operated his lumber business for fifty years.

On June 8, 1935, he married Lola S. Johnson and to this marriage two children were born: Donald Napoleon and Calvin Oscar.

Mr. Hultman was a member of the Mamerlund Lutheran Church of Stanton, Iowa, and was chairman of the building committee when the new church was built.

He was active in the Republican Party and served in the House of Representatives in the Forty-fifth, Forty-fifth Extra, Forty-sixth, Forty-sixth

Clark (Mike) Arnold, jr.

Mr. Arnold was married Oct. 18, 1941, to Mary Alice Arnold of Manchester. He served as one of the assistant vice presidents of the First State bank. He also operated a ranch northeast of Audubon.

He was the main organizer of the Quarterback club of Audubon and was very active in the Boy Scouts, the Audubon Industrial Development corporation and other civic groups.

Mr. Arnold had been a member and chairman of the county Social Welfare board.

Surviving besides his wife are two daughters, Mrs. Phillip (Jane) Johnson, New York City, and Mary Margaret, Los Angeles; one son, Clark Stuart, Audubon; his father, Clark Arnold, Sr., Audubon; one sister, Mrs. Roy Hansen, Beverly Hills, Calif.; and an aunt, Miss Dorothy Gordon, Chicago.

Services held for Mel Graham

A prominent Audubon lawyer and a member of the Iowa Highway commission, died suddenly Friday as he was on his way to work.

Funeral services for Mel M. Graham were held Monday morning at the United Methodist church. Burial was in the Maple Grove cemetery.

The 63-year-old attorney died at the wheel of his car while on his way to work Friday morning. He had not been in poor health. His death was apparently due to a heart attack.

Mr. Graham was born at Primghar and came to Audubon at the age of two. His birthdate was March 22, 1906. He was the son of John and Anne Graham.

His father was a well-known Audubon lawyer, mayor, newspaper publisher, state legislator and civic leader.

Mr. Graham attended the Audubon public schools and the University of Iowa. He graduated from Drake university with a degree in law in 1930 and joined his father in practicing law in that year.

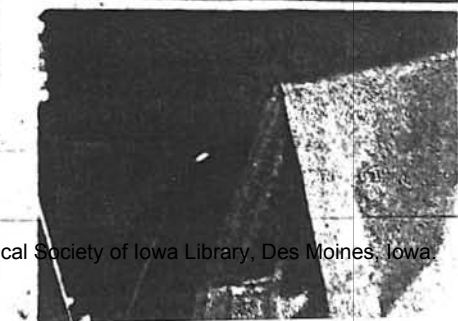
Qualifications are: to be between 17 and 21 by July 31 and reside on a farm that produces beef or be a daughter of parents engaged in beef production.

a national advertisement is about five times as great in a local weekly newspaper as the same ad in a metropolitan daily. The study showed the average readership of national ads was 31 per cent of men readers and 37 per cent of women readers for a 34 per cent average of all readers.

The survey also showed that the local newspaper is read by 2.79 people including the person to whom it is addressed. Thus, for each 1,000 of paid circulation an advertiser buys, the survey indicates the paper actually reaches 1,790 additional readers.

The study showed that the average reader spends an hour and 35 minutes reading their local newspaper, and many say they often re-read many parts of the paper sometime during the week before the next issue is published. The readership of news stories and features

from 79 per cent to 90 per cent of selected articles.

The survey was equally divided between men and women, and covered a general cross section of subscribers in the circulation area. The results were compiled from interviews with 18 per cent farmers, 19 per cent local tradesmen, 8 per cent government workers, 8 per cent retired individuals, 36 per cent housewives, 4 per cent clerks and 7 per cent miscellaneous.

If the survey means anything, it means that people read their hometown newspaper and they read it thoroughly. The reasons for this acceptance are bound to be as individual as the people, but we think one main reason is that the News-Advocate meets a need of the people it serves. While we constantly strive to improve our product, it's nice to be needed.--CHB
