Food stamp program here

Applications of four more counties have been approved for participation in the Department of Agriculture's Food Stamp program. They are Calhoun, Ida, Plymouth and Sioux.

Areas are selected for participation in the program on the basis of requests made by state and local welfare officials and by county Boards of Supervisors.

Under this cooperative federal-local program, needy families exchange the amount of money they would normally spend for food for coupons or stamps worth more. They then use these food coupons to purchase food at local markets.

Retailers redeem the coupons at local banks. The difference between the actual cash value of the stamps and what the family pays for them is borne by federal funds.

Department of Agriculture officials will be working with state welfare officials to establish target dates for the opening of the program in the newly-designated counties.

Home service meeting held

A meeting of homemakers service, home health aids and meals on wheels was held recently in Carroll.

Oliver N. Baker services Friday

POMEROY--Funeral services for Oliver N. Baker, 72, first chairman of the federal farm program in Calhoun county and former state legislator, were Friday in St. Mary's Catholic church here, the Rev. J. Charles Yetmar in charge.

Burial was in the parish cemetery.

Mr. Baker died Tuesday afternoon last week, apparently of a heart attack, while working at the cemetery.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe H. Baker, he was born on a farm east of Pomeroy, and attended local schools. He was married to Sara Deegan of Riceville in 1918, and they farmed southeast of town until April, 1966, when they moved to town.

Mr. Baker served two terms in the Iowa legislature as Calhoun county representative, and was chairman of the farm program in the county for its first 10 years.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Gene, State Center, and Jack, Davenport; two daughters, Marietta (Mrs. Rex) Harrington, Ironwood, Mich., and Janet (Mrs. Richard) Ryckert, The Wood

Wash.; 11 grandchildren; a great-grandchild; three brothers, Ernest, Pomeroy, Arnold, Sherburn, Minn., and Maurice, San Jose, Calif.; and three sisters, Veronica Baker, Ft. Dodge; Eldora (Mrs. Richard) Anderson, Ledyard, and Marie (Mrs. James) Triplett, Rolfe.

Some years ago, Mr. Baker made arrangements to have his middle and inner ears, hearing nerve and central pathways donated to the Temporal Bone Bank Program for Ear Research.

Council takes bid on sewer after confab

A decision to proceed with the proposed sanitary and storm sewer project in south Rockwell City was made by the City Council last week after meeting with its engineers and bonding attorney.

It decided to award the contract to Gjellefeld Construction Co. of Forest City, although its bid was 12.2% above preliminary estimates of the engineers.

Gjellefeld was the only bidder on the full project, bidding \$99,957.75, less a 2.65% discount if it received the award for both the sanitary and storm sewer work.

Final assessments on individual properties will be 10% higher than the preliminary estimates, and the city will bear the remainder of the cost.

Work on the project is expected to start in the immediate future, as soon as contracts are signed and performance bond posted.
