\$800,000 BANK SHORTAGE

CHICAGO—Ernest W. Mullins, 35, a Northbrook, Ill., contractor, was arrested by F. B. I. agents Tuesday in connection with an alleged \$800,000 shortage at the Farmers State bank of Brookston, Ind.

Mullins is charged with aiding Glen B. Garrett, 43, cashier at the Brookston bank, in the issuance of a \$30,000 certificate of deposit without authorization of the bank's directors, an illegal act.

Garrett was arrested in Brookston Monday and charged with issuing the certificate. F. B. I. agents said a preliminary investigation indicated a shortage of \$800,000 in the bank's funds.

Garrett, free on \$5,000 bond, said all the money went to Mullins, sole operator of a contracting business in Northbrook, a Chicago suburb. Brookston is in northwestern Indiana, near Lafayette.

"I lent him (Mullins) my own money until it ran out," Garrett said. "Like a fool, I thought he'd start paying back what he owed. But he never did."

Garrett, cashier of the bank since 1945, also was secretary of the board of directors. He is a brother of the bank president, John F. Garrett, and a son of I. Floyd Garrett, a Battle Ground, Ind., banker and former state senator and former chairman of the Indiana state budget commission.

A. D. Clem, Former Iowa State Senator, Dies Here

A. D. Clem, 65, 3600 Vine avenue, longtime Sioux City attorney and former state senator from Woodbury county, died at his residence Tuesday afternoon.

Senior member of the law firm which also includes his son, Robert C. Clem, Mr. Clem long had been active in local and state affairs. He served in the 50th, 50th special, 51st and 52d sessions of the general assembly of the state legislature, from 1942 to 1947.

He was born August 2, 1897, at Marshalltown, Ia., where he attended grade and high school. He attended Coe college and was graduated from the State University of Iowa law school. He married Wilma M. Heath at Montezuma, Ia., in 1921 and they came to Sioux City immediately afterward.

Mr. Clem opened his law practice here at that time.

In addition to having served in the state senate, he was an assistant Woodbury county attorney from 1927 to 1931. He also was past president of the Sgt. Floyd council, Boy Scouts of America; member of the Iowa state development commission; member of the Iowa State Safety council; member of Grace Methodist church and past president of its board of trustees; served as a delegate to the general and jurisdictional conferences of the Methodist

church; was past president of the High Twelve club here, was a member of the Lions club, and was past president of Sioux City chapter, National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Mr. Clem also was a member of the Iowa and American Bar associations; Morningside lodge 615, A. T. & A. M.; Columbian commandery 18, Knights Templar, Sioux City Consistory 5, Aub-Bekr Shrine temple, and Morningside chapter, Order of the Eastern Star.

published reports that the deficit — which was at a rate of \$3.3 billion a year in the first quarter — has not improved.

This made it clear that payments problem — far from being eliminated by the end of 1963, which was the administration's goal — has actually worsened this year, although still not at a rate comparable to the \$3.7 billion deficit of 1960.

The need for remedial measures has been discussed for several weeks, and was publicly conceded by Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon in testimony last week at hearings on the payments problem held by the senate-house economic committee.

Other measures which are expected to follow — some of them this week — include (1) deeper cuts in overseas spending and lending, (2) stronger promotion of American exports to recapture dollars gone abroad, and (3) more borrowing of foreign currencies to be used instead of dollars in settling accounts.

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Industrial Output Up for Month

WASHINGTON (AP) — Industrial production rose a full point in June on the federal reserve board index, and reached a new record of 125. The board announced Tuesday.

Construction activity climbed 2 per cent last month, the report said, but retail sales were virtually unchanged from May.

The index of industrial production is based on the 1957-59 average, which is placed at 100 for comparison purposes.

The previous record was 124.8 in May. The rate a year ago was 118.

Both consumer goods and business equipment registered increases, and total output was 2.5 per cent higher than the average level of production during the second half of 1962.

Production of consumer goods, the report said, reflected "mainly a rise of a tenth in automobiles from an already advanced level. Schedules for July indicate will return to about the level in most earlier months of
