E.L. Edwards dies at 87

Ernest L. Edwards, 87, who operated a general store at Shannon City for 50 years before retiring several years ago and who represented Union county in the Iowa state House of Representatives from 1938 to 1944, died at the Central Baptist hospital at Lexington, Ky., at 12:50 p.m. Tuesday. Mr. Edwards had been living in Lexington, where his daughter, Mrs. Thomas E. Murray, resides, for the last six years.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. Thursday at the Kerr Brothers funeral home at Lexington. Rev. Thomas W. Ditto will officiate. Burial will be in a Lexington cemetery.

Ernest Leroy Edwards was born at Ulica, Nebr., and was the son of the late Ezra and Amy Cross Edwards. He lived in Shannon City for many years and he and his wife, who died at Lexington last May, operated the general store until they sold it and retired several years ago.

Mr. Edwards was a member of Park United Methodist church at Lexington, and had been a member of the Shannon City Methodist church before moving to Lexington. He was a former member of the official board, a former Sunday school superintendent, and a former Sunday school teacher of the Shannon City church.

He was a former director of the First State Bank of Diagonal and a former member of the Shannon City school board before the Shannon City district became part of the East Union community school district.

He was a member of Afton lodge No. 151, A.F. & A.M.

Mr. Edwards is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Thomas E. Murray of Lexington, Ky.; two grandchildren, Lynn K. Murray and Thomas E. Murray III, both of Lexington; three sisters, Mrs. Ethel Bowman of Des Moines and Hazel Edwards and Marie Edwards, both of Grinnell; and a brother, Howard Edwards of Grinnell.

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to South Vietnam I believe it has been fulfilled," he said. "and I would not favor sending troops back to South Vietnam later."

Asked about his stand on welfare, Clark said that most people seem to think efforts should be made to get as many people off welfare as possible. But, he added, this is difficult, and there must be work for the people taken off welfare rolls. The present welfare system does not work very well for either the taxpayer or the persons receiving aid, he added. There should be improved programs to train people for jobs, so they are ready to get people off rolls when jobs are available to them. He added that the Job Corps was a good program to train young people who lacked work skills but that most centers have been closed.

Marijuana

Clark was asked what he feels about the penalties for use of marijuana. "I support the recommendations the study commission on marijuana made to President Nixon about a year ago," he said. He noted that this commission reported marijuana was not an addictive drug but felt its use should be discouraged because use over a long period of time might have adverse effects. It recommended that the simple possession of marijuana should not be a felony, although the selling of marijuana should remain a felony. The possession of one ounce or less of marijuana on which no profit had been made should not be considered even a misdemeanor. Iowa Sen. Harold Hughes and many others have sponsored a bill to implement the commission's report, he added.
