Pure Streets

. Clean Tower

Osceola streets were probably the "purest" in the state as far as being chemically treated was concerned on Monday when they were flushed with water from the first filling of the city's new tower.

The tower's first filling of 300,000 gallons of water last Thursday was treated with a powerful mixture of 100 pounds of chlorinated lime to purify the tank. That water was pumped out Monday and partly used to flush the main streets and most of it was drained into the "Q" pond.

The new tower was being filled again today and a sample will be sent to the state health department for approval. That approval will mean that the tower can be placed in use immediately.

Floyd Jones Services Held On Monday

Floyd Arden Jones, 58, former state senator, Clarke county official and Osceola businessman, died Friday at a Clarinda hospital. He had been in ill health for several years.

A resident of Clarke county for more than half a century, he had been active in public office for much of his adult life. He had also been a farmer and founded the Jones Cafe, now operated in Osceola by his son, Alfred.

Mr. Jones began his career in public office here when he became Clarke county auditor in January, 1932, and served in that capacity four terms until 1940. At that time he was elected state senator and represented the Clarke and Warren county district in the legislature for two four-year terms. He was also a member of the Clarke county Board of Supervisors for two three-year terms and served for six years as a member of the Osceola school board.

The son of Arden and Eva Adcock Jones, he was born Nov. 14, 1899, at Charlton and came to Clarke county with his family about four years later. He was a graduate of the Osceola high school and had been a resident of Clarke county for 54 years and, until his health failed, had made a successful career in both business and public life.

On March 19, 1919, at Denver, Colo., he was united in marriage with Elizabeth Tice, who preceded him in death on Oct. 20, 1955.

A veteran of World War I, Mr. Jones was a member of the American Legion.

Surviving are his son, Alfred, and daughter-in-law, Kay, of Osceola; three grandsons, Floyd, Fred and John; two brothers, Kenneth of Reno, Nev., and Ralph of Farrar, Iowa; and his mother-in-law, Mrs. J. H. Tice of Denver.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon in the Webster Funeral Home with Rev. Azel L. Smith, pastor of the First Methodist church, officiating. Burial was in the Longview cemetery.

★ Referendum On ★ Corn Nov. 25

Any resident of Clarke county who produced corn in 1958 or was entitled to share in the 1958 corn crop will be eligible to vote in the corn referendum to be held on Tuesday, November 25. It was announced this week by Carl E. Luce, chairman of the county ASC committee.

An owner-operator, cash tenant, standing rent or fixed-rent tenant, a share tenant or the landlord of a share tenant will be eligible to vote. The landlord of a standing rent, cash rent, or fixed-rent tenant will not be eligible.

In addition, there are three other groups of eligible voters:

Any operator or landlord of a farm for which a 1958 corn allotment was established even though corn was not planted.

Any person who planted corn in 1958 but did not harvest it; and

Anyone who placed corn allotment land in the soil bank in 1958.

The purpose of the November referendum will be to determine whether the present corn program should be changed for 1959.

Floyd Arden Jones

Floyd Arden Jones, son of Arden and Eva Adcock Jones, was born at Chariton, Iowa, November 14, 1899, and departed this life Friday, October 10, 1958, at the age of 58 years, 10 months and 26 days.

Floyd moved, with his parents, at an early age to Chase County, Nebraska and then moved to Osceola, Iowa. He attended Osceola Public School and was graduated from Osceola High School. During his school years he participated in the athletic events, declamatory and other activities, and had continued to carry these interests through life. He enlisted in the United States Navy and served his country during World War I.

Floyd was united in marriage to Elizabeth Catherine Tice on March 19, 1919 in Denver, Colorado. One son, Alfred Eugene Jones, was born January 20, 1920.

He farmed in Ward Township from the time of his marriage until January, 1932, when he was elected Clarke County Auditor. He served four terms in this office, from 1932 to 1940.

Floyd was then elected State Senator from the Clarke-Warren District in 1940 and served two terms. He was engaged in the restaurant business in Osceola from 1941 until 1948. He served as a member of the Osceola School Board for six years.

He moved to the farm in Jackson Township in February of 1948. He then served as a member of the Clarke County Board of Supervisors, acting as chairman of the board during his second term.

At an early age, Floyd accepted Christ and united with the Methodist Church in Osceola. During the years Floyd has served the church in a number of capacities. He served as a member of the Official Board, was Sunday School Superintendent, and taught a young married couples class. There were a number of other ways he served the church and Christ in the community. His life was devoted to the betterment of his fellowman through his social, civic and spiritual endeavors.

Floyd was a member of many civic groups and organizations. He was a member of the American Legion. He was known among his many friends and business associates as a man whose word could be trusted completely. He lived a good clean upright Christian life among us.

Survivors are his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred E. Jones of Osceola, Iowa; 3 grandchildren, Floyd Arden Jones, Frederick Otice Jones, and John Hammond Jones; 2 brothers, Kenneth R. Jones of Reno, Nevada, and Ralph R. Jones of Farrar, Iowa; one aunt, Jen Chambers of

Cheyenne, Wyoming.

Those preceding him are his father, Arden Jones; his mother, Eva Adcock Jones; brother, Lloyd Bernard Jones, and his wife, Elizabeth Catherine Jones.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, Oct. 13, at the Webster Funeral Home, with Rev. Axel L. Smith officiating. Music was by Emil Runder-spacher and Amy Ruth Harlan.
