William Joseph Kilpatrick,
youngest son of Samuel H. and
Elizabeth Kilpatrick, was born
near Randolph, Ia., on Sept. 8,
1889 and departed this life at the
Clarkson hospital in Omaha July
6, 1954.

He attended public school in
Randolph and the Metropolitan
Business college in Chicago, Ill.

Except for 16 months spent in
the service of his country during
World war I, he has spent his life
farming north of Randolph.

He entered military service in
September of 1917, as a member
of the first draft from Fremont
county. After a nine month train-
ing period at Camp Dodge, near
Des Moines, he was transferred to
Camp Taylor, Louisville, Ky., to
enter officers candidate school. On
Sept. 25, 1918 he was commission-
ed a second lieutenant of Field
Artillery. He then served the re-
maining months with a training
battery at Camp Jackson, S. C.

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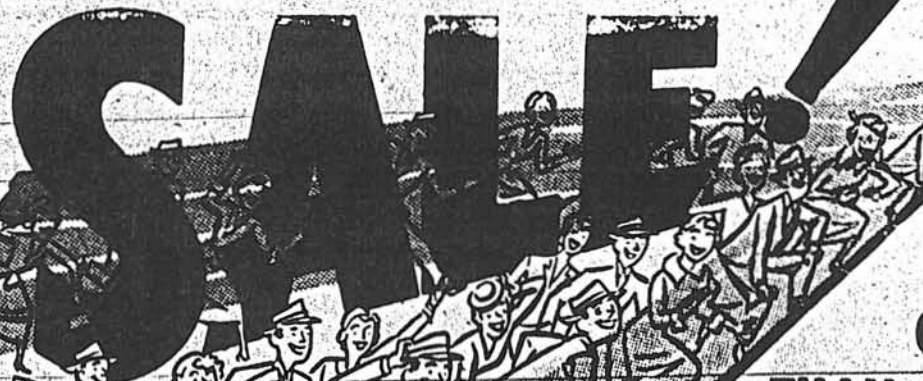
