Rural legislators, victorious Wednesday in a preliminary bid to hold down the population factor in the Senate, set battle lines to prevent any move to give the large population count more control.

A so-called "paired county" plan proposed by Reps. Elmer Vermeer, R-Pella, and Leonard Andersen, R-Sioux City, was before the House as the vehicle for a permanent reapportionment plan.

It would set up 53 legislative districts, with the seven most populous counties districts by themselves, and the other counties paired into 46 two-county districts.

Each district would elect one senator, plus one for each 3 1/2 per cent of the state's population it contains. This would result in a 59-member Senate. The House would have 112 members elected from the districts on a population basis.

The plan came under attack Wednesday because it would allow 33.68 per cent of the population to elect a majority of the Senate.

Rep. David Stanely, R-Muscataine, said the plan would never be accepted by the legislature elected next fall under the temporary reapportionment plan passed earlier, nor would it be accepted by the people.

He proposed a substitute calling for a Senate ranging from 47 to 57 members and a House from 108 to 115, with the House based on population and the Senate on population and area. It included a provision putting a ceiling of 40 per cent on the population segment that would elect a majority of the Senate, and a floor of 35 per cent.

"We are just plain kidding ourselves," Stanley said, "if we pass a permanent plan with less population control than the temporary plan."

Walter F. Noble, 68, of 415 East Huron Street, Missouri Valley, county assessor of Harrison County since Sept. 8, 1954, passed away about 2:15 p.m., Thursday in Community Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient for one week.

Mr. Noble was a former state representative for Harrison County. A Republican, he held that office before being appointed county assessor.

He was also a former lieutenant-governor of District 8 of Kiwanis.

Mr. Noble was a veteran of World War I.

He was a member of First Presbyterian Church and of Valley Lodge No. 232 A.F. & A.M.

Survivors include his wife, Eva, of Missouri Valley.

The remains are at Hardy-Walker Funeral Home.

# NOBLE FUNERAL TO BE SATURDAY

Funeral services will be held in First Presbyterian Church here at 2 p. m., Saturday for **Walter F. Noble, 69**, of Missouri Valley, county assessor of Harrison County who passed away Thursday afternoon in Community Memorial Hospital.

The Rev. Robert T. McDill will officiate. Interment will be in Rose Hill Memorial Gardens.

The body lies in state at Hardy-Walker Funeral Home where it will remain until 1 p. m. Saturday when it will be taken to the church. The casket will be open prior to the time of the service.

Mr. Noble became ill March 18. He was a patient in the hospital for a week.

He was born Oct. 11, 1894 in Dublin, Ireland, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Noble.

Mr. Noble served with the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War I.

He was a resident of the Missouri Valley community the past 23 years.

Mr. Noble was state representative for Harrison County in 1947 and 1948. He was county assessor of Harrison County since Sept. 8, 1954. He was a former lieutenant-governor of District 8 of Kiwanis Clubs.

Surviving are his wife, Eva M. Noble, of Missouri Valley; one sister, Rhoda Vore of London, England; one brother, Bill Noble, in California; three nephews, Gary Noble of Windsor, Ontario, Canada, Glenn Noble of Toronto, Canada and Jack Stevenson, in Ireland; and five nieces, Ermine J. Noble, in California, Mollie Dawson of Toronto, Canada, Jean Gilchrist of London, England, Frances Chandler of Dover, England and Emily Russell of Belfast, Ireland.

A third member of the plane's crew, 1st Lt. Harold W. Welch of Detroit, Mich., was released March 21. All three pilots had parachuted from their plane and Welch was injured in landing.

Presidential press secretary George Reedy announced Thursday in Austin, Tex., that Holland and Kessler would be released today. He said arrangements for their return had been made through Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin in Washington.

Last Sunday, U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk had announced on a television program that the men would be released in the near future.

The three men took off in their unarmed twin-jet from a base at Toul-Rosieres, France, March 10 on what U.S. Air Force called a routine training flight.

They had been briefed on special procedures to avoid straying across into Communist East Germany because the Russians had downed a T39 on Jan. 28, killing the three American officers aboard.

The weather was partly cloudy, but a haze made visibility poor. U.S. air control officers tried to keep the reconnaissance bomber on course, even giving radio calls in plain language that Soviet monitors could understand.
