terms in the Iowa House.

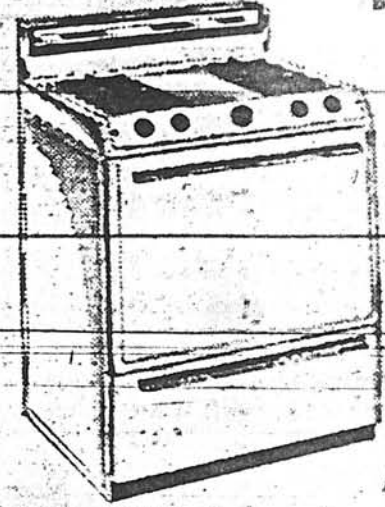
He and Mrs. Dodds were

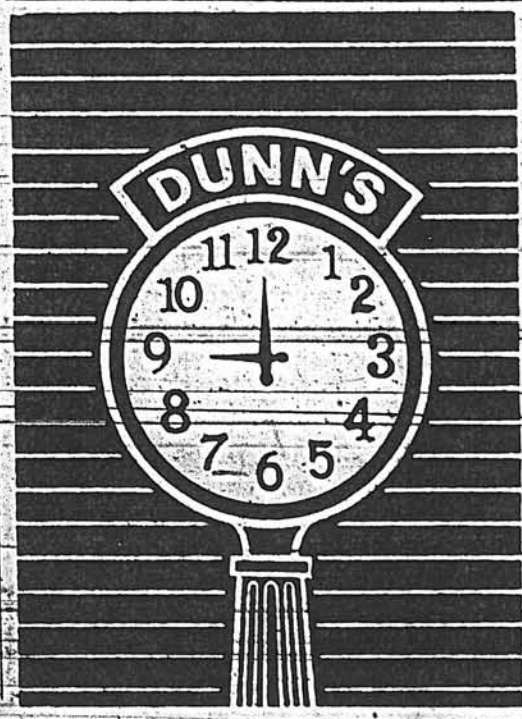
