Final rites were held for a former Malvernian at Mansfield Funeral Home Wednesday, J. Raymond Hall, 95, whose death occurred June 1, at Atlantic. He had been a resident of this community for some 35 years, prior to moving to Heritage House in Atlantic.

He was born in Centerville N. J., Aug. 24, 1879, the son of Captain John Cox Hall and Mary Ann Van Fleet Hall, and was one of nine children, six brothers and two sisters.

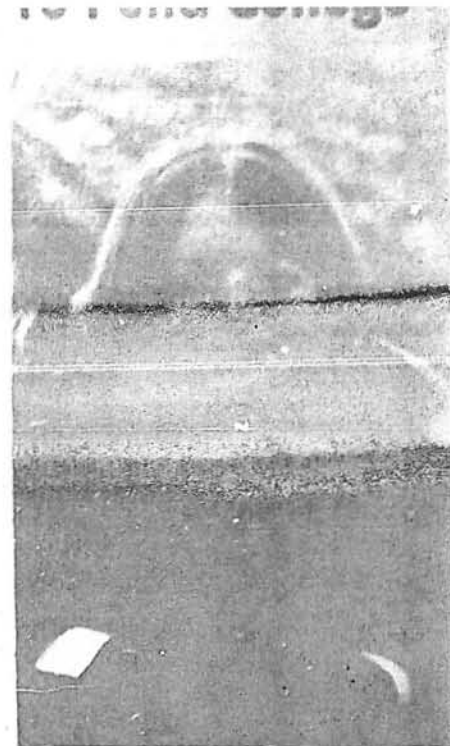
