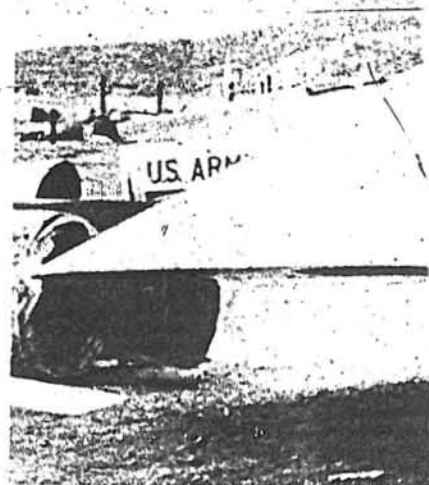

Ex-Legislator Less Is Dead

DUBUQUE, IA. — Frank W. Less, 63, Dubuque lawyer who served two terms in the Iowa House of Representatives from 1943 to 1946, died Monday morn- ing at his home.

He practiced law in Cascade from 1929 to 1960, moving then to Dubuque but maintaining an office in Cascade. A Democrat, he was an unsuccessful candi- date for Congress from the Sec- ond District in 1962, losing to the Republican incumbent, James Bromwell.

Mr. Less was a graduate of Loras Academy here and a 1929 graduate of the Creighton Uni- versity Law School in Omaha. He was a member of the Loras College Board of Regents.

Surviving are his wife, Mon- ica; four sons; twin daughters, and 11 grandchildren.

N.Y. Strike To Be Resumed

NEW YORK, N.Y. (AP) — Negotiations to end a strike by public school teachers were re- ceased, until Tuesday, because the 900 schools with 1.1 million pupils would have closed Mon- day anyway because of Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year.

Meetings Sunday between the Board of Education and repre- sentatives of the 55,000-member United Federation of Teachers broke off in the afternoon. The teachers said the strike would continue Tuesday.

The dispute stems from the dismissal last spring of 10 teachers by the local board of the Ocean Hill-Brownsville ex- perimental project, in a pre- dominantly Negro and Puerto Rican neighborhood. The 10 later were exonerated by a judge's ruling.

The Ocean Hill-Brownsville schools have been operating with replacement teachers.

About a third of the public schools have been open during the walkout, handled by skele- ton staffs. Attendance by pupils has been minimal.
