Mrs. Mae A. Lynch, Local Attorney Died on June 3



Mrs. Mae A. Lynch, a practicing attorney here since 1932, died June 3, at 11 p.m. in the home of her sister, Mrs. Kathryn Mabon in Minneapolis, Minn. Mrs. Lynch had been ill for the past 3½ years, however her death came suddenly as the result of a heart condition. Funeral rites were held here Saturday morning at 8:30 o'clock in Sacred Heart Church. Rev. Fr. Henry B. Karhoff was celebrant of the requiem Mass. Interment was in Calvary cemetery. Pall bearers were: D. A. Mitchell, Lawrence Flaherty, A. R. Mackovets, Jay J. DeLay, Francis Kelly and R. R. Allen.

Mae A. Fritz was born in Ashton, Iowa, Sept. 19, 1883, the daughter of Helen and Peter Fritz. She was reared in that vicinity and following her graduation from Iowa State Teachers College at Cedar Falls, she came to Pocahontas where she served as principal of the junior high school. In September 1912 she was united in marriage with the late Thomas F. Lynch, a local attorney. Following his death in March 1928, she studied law at the University of Iowa and was admitted to the bar in 1932. 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CCC Will Sell Low-Grade Corn to County Feeders

Any government corn showing signs of going out of condition in the CCC bins located in Pocahontas county will be offered local feeders at the market price, it has been announced by Henry Loots, chairman of the county PMA committee.

Grain which may be sold in this manner will be grades 4, 5 and "sample." Most government corn stored in this county tests No. 3 or better but the top layer in a number of bins grades lower, according to Chairman Loots.

Disposal of the low-grade corn will serve the dual purpose of providing a limited local supply at market prices and slightly increasing available bin space for 1952 farm-stored corn delivered in settlement of price support loans. Farmers interested in buying this corn, may contact the County PMA

A number of years ago he was in the automobile and insurance business here. From 1919 until his retirement in 1946 he was superintendent of the light and power department in Pocahontas. He was a member of SS. Peter Church where he served for many years as a trustee. He was also a time member of the Columbus and the Catholic Club.

Mr. Sedlacek never married. He is survived by one brother and three nephews.

July 1st Deadline For Homestead Tax Military Exemptions

Notices in this issue of the Record-Democrat by County Auditor Marie Pavik and County Assessor Duncan C. Grant call attention to the fact that July 1st is the deadline for filing for Homestead and Military tax exemptions.

Homestead exemptions are normally filed with the assessor at the time of making annual assessments. If no application was made at that time, Grant has announced that property owners may call at his office in the courthouse here and make such application.

Military tax exemptions need be filed only once with the auditor's office. Veterans who served before Sept. 2, 1945, and who have not previously filed an application may do so at the auditor's office.
