Floyd J. Pine Died In Arizona

This community was grieved and shocked when word came Tuesday morning of the death of Floyd J. Pine at a Phoenix, Arizona, hospital at 11:30 Monday evening, August 27, 1956.

Mr. and Mrs. Pine, who moved to Phoenix about six years ago were frequent visitors to Columbus Junction and spent the greater portion of the summer here returning to Phoenix about four weeks ago.

Mr. Pine seemed to be enjoying excellent health but recent examinations revealed a lung condition which developed rapidly and ended in death less than two weeks after entering a Phoenix hospital for surgery.

Floyd Joseph Pine was born on a farm near Columbus Junction, July 1, 1893, son of Alexander F. and Mary Skipton Pine. He was educated in the public schools of this county and spent the major portion of his life here.

He had a deep interest in national welfare and while a young man joined Co. K of the National Guard at Washington, Iowa. He accompanied Co. K. to the Mexican border in 1916, later returned to Columbus Junction when the company returned and on March 26, 1917 when the National Guard was called out due to prospect of war in Europe he accompanied the Company to Ft. Madison and in September 1917 went to Camp Deming, New Mexico.

Later he went to Officer's training school and was commissioned lieutenant and served overseas in the First Division, U. S. Army as First Lieutenant. Following the Armistice in November 1918, he remained in Germany with the Army of occupation until July 1919.

Returning home he engaged briefly in farming and then in the automobile business at Columbus City.

In 1926 he and his brother, Ernie Pine, formed the Pine Bros. Auto Company and came to Columbus Junction where they built the large garage on north Main street, which they operated with Chevrolet, Oldsmobile and the Buick agency successfully until two years ago the Columbus Junction business was sold to Harold (Spin) Duncan.

Twelve years ago a branch was established at Wapello doing business as Pine Bros. Auto Company, in which he and his brother retained their interest.


He was united in marriage December 19, 1924, to Ruth D. Stone of this city.

In addition to his business interests Mr. Pine also took an active interest in community affairs and served on the town council and as mayor.

He was elected state representative from Louisa county on the Republican ticket in 1936 and served in the 47th, 48th, 49th and extra session. He was then elected senator for the Muscatine-Louisa district and served in the 50th, 50th extra and 51st sessions of the state senate. He took an active part in legislative procedure and was a member of the Iowa State Historical Society.

SERIOUSLY INJURED WOMAN'S PLIGHT BRINGS MANY OFFERS OF ASSISTANCE

The milk of human kindness flowed freely in Grand Island over the weekend as Hall Countians and just plain strangers flocked to give aid following one of the worst traffic accidents here in recent years.

The accident was the one which occurred about 10:20 a. m. Saturday, a mile east of Wood River on Highway 30. Six Iowans were injured including two who were very seriously hurt.

Mrs. Nola M. Werner, 24, of Grandview, Iowa, was most seriously injured and reports today indicated she owes her life to the quick response of blood donors here. As of this morning, she had received 19 pints of whole blood since the accident.

The story of that response is a heart-warming one.

It began when Mrs. Werner first reached the hospital — near the brink of death and in desperate need of blood.

Oscar Peterson, son of Swen and Sofia Peterson, was born August 7, 1874, in Toulon, Illinois. He passed away on February 27, 1957, at Storm Lake, Iowa, at the age of eighty-three years.

Mr. Peterson moved to Alta with his parents in 1876. Here he grew to manhood. In 1897 he was united in marriage with Ida M. Johnson. To this union ten children were born.

Except for two years during which he was in the implement business in Schaller, he spent his life in farming.

He was very prominent in civic, community and church affairs. He served as a member of the county Board of Education and was president of the National Farm Loan Association in Storm Lake. He was also a charter member of the County Farm Bureau. He served in the Fiftieth, Fiftieth Extra, and Fifty-first sessions of the General Assembly. For many years he was an active member of the Methodist church, and was very much interested in its affairs until the time of his death.

He was a director of the Columbus Junction State Bank, and a partner in the Pine Brothers Automobile Company. He was a member of the American Legion, D.A.V., Odd Fellows, and Masonic orders. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Mr. Pine moved to Phoenix, Arizona, two years ago on account of his health.

He is survived by his widow, two sons, a grandchild, his mother, Mrs. Alex Pine of Columbus City, seven brothers and four sisters.




