Stewart Dies at 71; Cattle Breeder, Ex-State Senator

Paul Stewart, 71, died unexpectedly at 10:15 this morning of a severe heart attack at his home. He was born Jan. 1, 1877, the son of William and Stella Ketchum Stewart on a farm near Hawkeye.

The Delsing Funeral home, Maynard is in charge of services which will be held at the Presbyterian church in Oelwein Monday, Feb. 9 at 2 p. m. with the Rev. L. W. Hauter officiating.

Mr. Stewart was state senator beginning in 1937 for two terms. He was prominent in the National Holstein Association of America, of which he was a director for 12 years. He was also president of the state association; president of the Fayette county Farm Bureau for a number of years; he was the first Master Farmer and a director of the State Farm Service.

Last summer he judged Holstein cattle in South America as a representative of the National Association in Ecuador and of late he has been classifying Holstein throughout the United States.

He married Lena Struthhoff of Maynard Dec. 25, 1901 at Maynard; they lived on a farm near Maynard for 46 years until they retired in April, 1947 moving to their present home at 140 North Frederick avenue in Oelwein.

He was a Mason and for a number of years was the Master of the Maynard lodge. He was a member of the Elks. He was a member of the Presbyterian church.

He is survived by his wife; one daughter, Gladys Stewart Paschal, Lamont; three sons, John of Waterloo; Irving of Maynard; R. D. of Petersborough, N. H.; ten grandchildren; four brothers, Ed of Maynard; Wes of Des Moines; Sam of Oelwein; Dale of So. St. Paul; one sister, Mabel Knight of Maynard. One daughter and one brother preceded him in death.

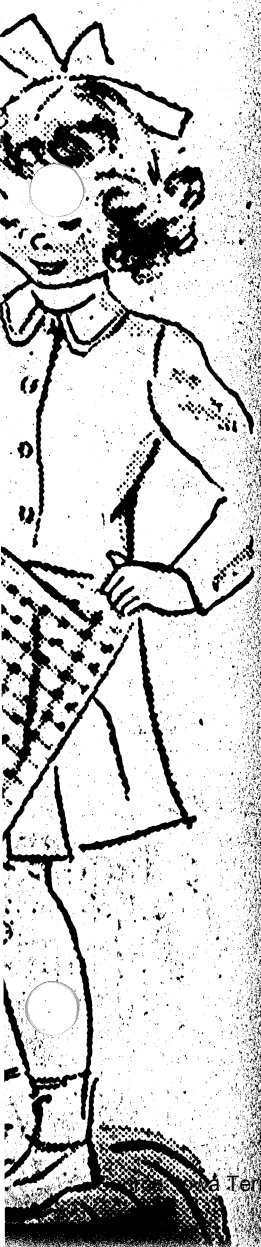

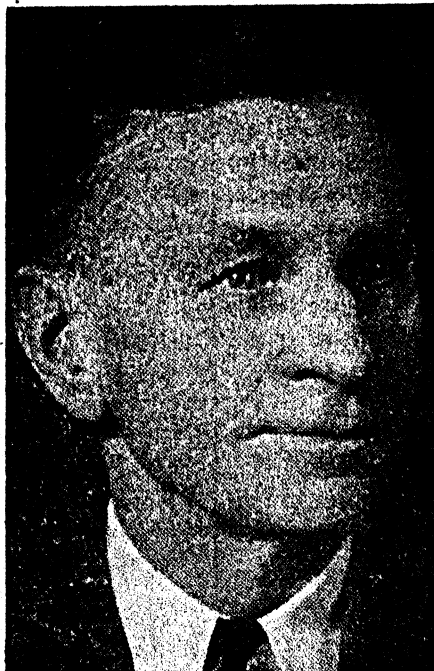
Wadena Man Crawls Mile After Accident

MAYNARD — Funeral service for Paul P. Stewart, 71, prominent Holstein cattle breeder and former state senator, was held Monday afternoon in the Oelwein Presbyterian church with burial in the Long Grove cemetery at Maynard. Rev. L. W. Hauter officiated.

Paul P. Stewart, son of William and Stella Ketchium Stewart, was born Jan. 1, 1877. He was united in marriage to Lena Struthoff, Dec. 25, 1901, at Maynard. They lived on a farm southwest of Maynard for 46 years until their retirement in April, 1947, when they moved to Oelwein, where they purchased a home.

Mr. Stewart was State Senator for two terms. He was prominent in the National Holstein association, and was president of Fayette County Farm Bureau for a number of years.

He was a member of Maynard's Masonic lodge, of the Elks, and the Presbyterian church.

Only last summer he judged cattle in Ecuador, South America.

For a number of years he was owner and breeder of Holstein cattle, selling out in 1947.

He is survived by his wife, a daughter, Gladys, Mrs. F. Paschal, Lamont; three sons, John, Waterloo; Irving, Maynard; Robert, Petersburg, N. Y.; ten grandchildren, four brothers and one sister. A daughter and one brother preceded him in death.

Supreme Court Rules Out Farm Land Tax Credit

DES MOINES — UP — The Iowa supreme court today declared the agricultural land credit tax law unconstitutional.

The original act, passed in 1937, was declared invalid in 1940, and the 1945 legislature passed a new law providing that owners of tracts of land of 10 acres or more used exclusively for agricultural purposes and located within school districts where taxes are high get credit or exemption from a school tax of 15 mills or more.

The action, which came in a 5 to 3 decision, will prevent distribution of more than \$4,500,000 in the agricultural land credit tax fund. The money will revert to the state general fund.

"We hold the law cannot be sustained as being in aid of agricultural within the public policy of this state," the opinion said. "It is doubtful if there is any net incidental benefit to the public from such a law. Any incidental benefits accruing from the general public by reason of income betterment of agricultural land owners is entirely offset by the increased tax burden the public must pay to give the agricultural land owners the tax exemptions that result in their increased income."

It was one of the school aid bills passed by the 1945 legislature.

Validity of the act was attacked in a suit filed by Mrs. Laura Dickinson, a landowner in Epworth, a small community near Dubuque. The suit claimed that in 1946, the plaintiff paid \$71.75 in taxes on a 4.13 acre tract of agricultural land, while a neighbor in the same school district paid only \$36.92 on 87.34 acres, being eligible for tax credit it fell in the 10-acre bracket. The suit alleged that the state discriminated between tracts of agricultural land just because of size.

District Judge John G. Chalmers of Dubuque dismissed Mrs. Dickinson's petition and held the new act constitutional. The case then was appealed to the state supreme court.

For four years he was a member of the Maynard consolidated school board, and served several terms as president of the Fayette county farm bureau, and county and state farm service companies.
