1959 wheat allotments.

Winter wheat producers will have until June 1 and spring wheat producers until June 10 to dispose of any planted excess wheat acreage by pasturing or cutting for hay or silage, it was stated by Milton F. Sanders, chairman of the county ASC committee.

After these deadlines, excess wheat acreage cannot be pastured or cut for hay or silage. After the deadlines, producers may get into compliance with their wheat allotments only by disposing of excess wheat acreage by mechanical means such as plowing under or otherwise incorporating the growth into the soil.

Any Dickinson County farmers who have planted wheat should get in touch with the county ASC office.

Farmers who have any questions concerning disposal of excess wheat acreage may get complete information at the county ASC office in Spirit Lake.

Farmers who have 1958-crop soybeans stored on their farms under price-support still have time to reseal them for an additional one-year period, Sanders also announced this week.

Farm stored soybeans under loan or purchase agreement are eligible for reseal this year for the first time. Eligibility requirements are the same for quality and storage as under original loans, and the Iowa farmer who reseals his beans receives a storage payment of 17 cents a bushel for a full year of storage.

Farmers who reseal soybeans, Chairman Sanders pointed out, are in position to watch the market in future months and redeem their beans at any time they find it is to their advantage to do so. If resealed beans are redeemed in less than a year, the storage payment is prorated.

Chairman Sanders said current Department of Agriculture reports indicate there may be considerable demand for soybeans for export to Western Europe the rest of 1959.

Funeral services were held Saturday for William (Bill) Yager, 70, who died last Wednesday evening at the Delaney Nursing Home in Spencer. The rites were held in the Methodist church with the Rev. C. B. Wittstruck officiating.

Yager was well known in Spirit Lake and Dickinson county. He served six terms as Dickinson county state representative (1932-44), was a delegate to the national Democratic Convention in 1944, was field representative for the Iowa Taxpayers Association three years, was township clerk 10 years, township assessor four years, and superintendent of his Sunday school for many years.

Mr. Yager operated a general store in Montgomery for 11 years, had the Ford dealership in Spirit Lake from 1927 to 1936, and was a Spirit Lake realtor from 1940 until becoming ill four years ago. He had been bedfast since the sickness.

He is survived by: one son, Duane of Spirit Lake; five brothers; and three sisters. Interment was in Lakeview cemetery.

Lakes Are Filling

Probably the brightest side of
the heavy rains came from re-
ports from the Lakes area,
where residents are showing
signs of optimism concerning
the water levels. Lost Island
Lake near Ruthven, according to
reports, last night began to run
water from the inlet into the
lake, and a definite improve-
ment in the lake condition was
reported this morning.

Cecil Nelson, boat house op-
erator on Big Spirit Lake, re-
ported early this morning that
the water level there is up near-
ly three inches and is still
climbing rapidly. Lake level is
presently about 18 inches below
the run-over point into East
Okoboji.

East (don't look now, your
mud is showing) Okoboji, ac-
cording to Glen Hafer of the
Hafer Boat works, is up about
five inches this spring. Two
inches of the rise was a result
of last night's rain. Ollie Goy-
ette reports that Minnewashta
Lake is up about six inches
since the rains began.

Near Spencer, Rossie re-
ported 3.30 inches of rain in
about three hours from 3:30
p.m. until 6:30 p.m. Ruthven
had 2.90 inches during the
same period. Greenville re-
ported heavy flooding in
basements. Highway 71 was
under water in several
places, including the low-
land area near the

Yeager was widely known in

activities and public service. He
served for a time with the Iowa
Tax Commission, was a town-
ship clerk for many years, was
an active member of the Meth-
odist church, and a constant
participant in community serv-
ice projects.

He served five terms, during
the late 1930's and early 40's as
Democratic committeeman from
Dickinson county.

He is survived by one son,
Duane, of Spirit Lake.

Funeral services have been set
for Saturday at 2 p.m. in the
Methodist church at Spirit Lake.
Burial will be in Lakeview
cemetery.

WRIGHT, WALTER F., Cadillac and Oldsmobile Dealer, 813 Diamond Street, Onawa, born Moorhead, February 19, 1907, son of D. O. and Dora (Younkin) Wright. Completed Moorhead grade school and graduated from high school in 1924. During school days he assisted his father in his hardware and implement business; went into business with his father in 1924 and continued until his father's death in 1931; thereafter he operated the entire business until 1947; purchased implement business in Onawa in 1945, and in 1946 built and moved into modern display sales room and service quarters, occupying same to date; in 1948 was appointed Cadillac and Oldsmobile dealer for Onawa and surrounding territory. Trained at Camp Dodge, Mr. Wyland was assigned to the Field Artillery and went overseas. In February, 1919, he was discharged. Upon his return to civilian life he resumed his law practice. In addition to having held the offices of mayor and city attorney of Avoca, he has also served on the Avoca Board of Education and on the Pottawattamie County Board of Education. As farmer and real estate operator he is further serving his neighbors. Mr. Wyland is active in the American Legion, having been a charter member of the Avoca Post, of which he was first adjutant. Mr. Yager owns a controlling interest in this corporation and is its president and treasurer. He is a member of the Indian Creek Country Club, the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce, the B'nai B'rith, the Young Men's Christian Association and the Eagles. A Thirty-second degree Mason, he belongs to the Consistory, the Shrine, and the High Twelve Club. He worships in the Temple Judah and was chairman of the Jewish Federated Charities. Charitable work and his family are his avocational interests. Mr. Yager married, as his second wife, in 1944, at St. Paul, Mildred P. Putzman, daughter of Abraham Putzman. YAGER, W. A., Owner, Real Estate and Insurance Business, corner Court and Main streets, Spirit Lake, born Audubon, October 6, 1888, son of J. F. and Mary Elizabeth (Moreland) Yager. He graduated from high school at Spirit Lake in 1907. He first farmed for his father in Dickinson County; 1911-1914, moved to Spirit Lake, entering grocery business; 1914, bought, owned and operated Yager's General Store, Montgomery, until 1925; sold out in 1925 and traveled in western states; 1926-1928, sales capacity with Des Moines Life and Annuity Company; 1929-1938, partner and then sole owner Ford dealership in Spirit Lake; sold garage in 1938, and established real estate and insurance business, which he has owned and operated to present date. 1914-1926, he was Montgomery Township Clerk; 1932-1946, served in Iowa Legislature (Democratic member); 1949-1951, city councilman, Spirit Lake; 1936-1947, did part time promotional work for Iowa taxpayers; is active in Red Cross work and other benevolent enterprises. Member, Odd Fellows Lodge, and has held all offices in Methodist Church. Hobby is fishing. Married, Spirit Lake, December 10, 1911, Minnie Mae Hartman, daughter of Albert and Emma (Waroch) Hartman. Child: Duane, born February 23, 1930, now in Air Corps, Camp Randolph, Texas.
