Government troops are still  
fighting desperate small hand-  
to-hand engagements with the  
Viet Cong in the sprawling out-  
skirts of the town.

All during the night the Viet  
Cong hurled probes at the gov-  
ernment positions in the west  
end of the town.

Of some 300 government  
troops who landed as reinforce-  
ments early Thursday morning,  
only three are left. These three  
 lone Vietnamese survivors stag-  
gered out of the jungle early  
this morning.

The rest, including three  
American advisers, are gone  
somewhere in the hell of Dong  
Xoai.

Two Americans also stag-  
gered out of the jungle, both  
wounded in the leg, clothed in  
rags and chattering incoherently  
in shock. They had been at  
the special forces camp a mile  
from Dong Xoai that was  
smashed in the initial attack.  
Somehow they survived in the  
jungle.

One of them, Lt. (j.g.) Frank  
Peterlin of Oglesby, Ill., had  
been in charge of a Navy Sea-  
bee detachment doing construc-  
tion work at the camp.

## Sanford Zeigler, Former State Senator, Dies

Sanford Zeigler Jr., 73, who  
served this community over a  
long period of years as a public  
official, died early this morning  
in Hollywood Memorial hospital,  
in Hollywood, Fla. His death  
came at 1:30 a.m.

Zeigler suffered a stroke on  
May 29, and a severe coronary  
attack on June 7 from which he  
never rallied.

He and his daughter, Virginia,  
moved to Dania, Fla., a year  
ago. Other than that he had  
spent his entire life in this com-  
munity.

### Public Offices

Zeigler had served the public  
through all three levels of gov-  
ernment, county, state and na-  
tional. His experience dated  
back to 1913 when he started in  
his first public office. At that  
time he was named director of  
the Southeastern Iowa Horticul-  
ture association and served as  
its vice-president in 1915.

For the next two years he  
served as secretary of the Jef-  
ferson county Agricultural asso-  
ciation and fair.

From 1919 to 1923 he was  
clerk of the district court for  
Jefferson county, from 1922 to  
1935 he was chairman of the  
GOP Central committee and  
was appointed to the county  
board of supervisors in 1924.

In 1932 he was named chair-  
man of the First District GOP  
committee, and in 1935 was  
elected state representative. He  
served two terms as state sena-  
tor from this district, 1937-1943,  
and from 1943 to 1955 he served  
as a member of the Iowa High-  
way Commission. He was chair-  
man of the commission five of  
the 12 years.

On Nov. 7, 1955, he was ap-  
pointed branch manager of the  
Small Business Administration  
office at Davenport. He retired  
from that post Aug. 30, 1957.

Also through the years he  
served in other capacities. From

The number of U.S. casual-  
ties in Viet Nam jumped again  
when a two-engine C123 trans-  
port ferrying ammunition and  
supplies crashed in flames in  
central Viet Nam, killing at  
least eight Americans.

### Recover Bodies

A U.S. spokesman said a  
ground party recovered the bod-  
ies of two Air Force men and  
six Army men. He did not know  
how many had been aboard.

Military sources were uncer-  
tain of the cause of the crash.

The three confirmed deaths  
at Dong Xoai brought the toll of  
American dead in Vietnamese  
combat since December 1961 to  
409. The dead in the C123 crash  
would not be added to the com-  
bat toll unless enemy fire was  
determined.

Government and Viet Cong  
casualties were heavy in the  
fierce fighting that began at  
Dong Xoai early Thursday.  
About 150 civilians also were  
reported killed, including many  
women and children.

The government reported 280  
casualties for its forces — 108  
killed, 126 missing and 46  
wounded. It claimed that 700  
Communist guerrillas were  
killed — 300 in Dong Xoai and  
another 400 by U.S. and Viet-  
namese air strikes 3 to 4 miles  
north of the town.

None of the government  
figures were confirmed by U.S.  
military officials.

### 121 Sorties

U.S. and Vietnamese planes  
flew 121 sorties against the  
Dong Xoai area Thursday.

Through the night Commu-  
nists probed at government po-  
sitions in the town, and there  
was hand-to-hand fighting on  
the outskirts.

The shooting ended at 6:30  
a.m. when the Viet Cong pulled  
out of the area and disappeared  
into the jungle, the U.S. spokes-  
man said.

Vietnamese rangers and air-  
borne units combed the town,  
picking up the dead and wound-  
ed. No further contact with the  
Communist guerrillas was re-  
ported.

### Matter Of Right

You, the retail customer, will  
not be able to claim the bene-  
fits of any excise tax cut "as  
matter of right," says Leo  
Gold, chief tax expert of the  
Research Institute of America.

You, the retailer or manufac-  
turer, will not be required to  
pass on the benefits of excise  
tax cuts to your ultimate cus-  
tomers.

The key point, in short, is  
as Gold emphasizes, that "price  
cuts resulting from these ex-  
cise tax cuts will be much more  
a matter of business policy than  
tax law" — a vital aspect in  
deed.

Putting it even more plainly,  
manufacturers and retailers will  
be able to decide strictly as a  
matter of business policy whether  
to: retain present prices; cut  
them by more, less or by exactly  
the amount of the excise tax  
cut; make the price cuts now  
wait.

### No Refund

Many of the price cuts which  
have been so widely publicized  
in advance of the excise tax  
reductions have been entirely  
motivated by business reasons.  
Neither the retailers nor the  
manufacturers will get any tax  
credit or refund because of their  
cuts. The extent and size of  
price cuts on and after July 1  
again will be primarily a mat-  
ter of business policy.

Special conditions apply to  
autos and air conditioners; thus  
the advice at the start of this  
column. On other items it will  
be up to buyers and sellers to  
negotiate price adjustments be-  
fore July 1 — and after that  
date, price comparisons before  
and after the tax cuts will in-  
dicate what and where the gains  
are.

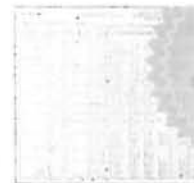
