Marion Claire Hamiel, son of Henry W. and Louella (Eves) Hamiel, was born near Springdale in Cedar county on Sept. 7, 1898. At the age of seven his parents moved to the farm south of Tipton where he attended a rural school and graduated from Tipton high school in 1916. He entered the University of the S. A. T. C. in 1918. In January, 1919, he resumed his regular studies and was graduated from the college of Liberal Arts in June, 1921, and in 1923 received his LL.B.

After graduating and being admitted to the bar he returned to Tipton where he engaged in the practice of law. He was elected county attorney in the spring of 1924 and served three consecutive terms in that office. While engaged in private practice he served as city solicitor. In 1932 he was elected a member of the board of the Tipton Consolidated school and was chairman for seventeen years.

He served as state senator in the 49th General Assembly, resigning in 1942 to become district judge in the Eighteenth Judicial District, and was acting in that capacity at the time of his death, which occurred on Sept. 25, 1954.

He was married in 1924 to Thelma E. Davis, daughter of Reuben and Estella M. Davis of Buffalo Center, Iowa. To this marriage four children were born: Eleanor (Mrs. Robert Van Nostrand) Norman, Keith and Carol. He is survived by his wife, four children, his mother Mrs. Louella Pilkington, and two grandsons.

His religious life was grounded in the Society of Friends, of which he was justly proud. He was born into a Methodist family, himself being a faithful communicant of the Tipton Methodist church. He was active in the various organizations of the church.

He was a member of Cedar Lodge No. 11, and of the Garey-Whalen Post of the American Legion. He was also interested and active in the various local and civic groups.

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#### ORA E. HUSTED

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Ora E. Husted, begs to submit the following memorial:

Ora E. Husted, the son of Thomas and Mary Susan Husted, was born in Ohio Township, Madison County, Iowa, March 20, 1875, and passed away March 21, 1954, at Winterset, Iowa, at the age of seventy-nine years.

On January 22, 1899, he was united in marriage to Etna E. Kale, and to this union were born four children: Cresley, Des Moines, Iowa; Merrill, Winterset, Iowa; Mrs. Esther Miskey, Los Angeles, California; and Maurice, who passed away at the age of four years.

Mr. Husted received his formal education in the Madison County schools and served on the township school boards for many years. He was a farmer and breeder of purebred livestock. During World War I, he was on the local finance board. He was very active in Hi Y and boys' club work.

Mr. Husted was a prominent figure in Republican political circles in Madison County. He served as Representative in the Forty-fourth General Assembly and as Senator from the Adair-Madison district in the Forty-fifth, Forty-fifth Extra, Forty-sixth, Forty-sixth Extra, Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth General Assemblies.

He retired in 1950 after having served ten years for the State Tax Commission, during which time he made his home in Des Moines, Iowa.

Senator Goetsch was a man of character, noted for his friendliness and for his host of loyal friends. He has often been remembered as a worthy advocate of the welfare of the common man.

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Marion C. Hamiel, begs leave to submit the following:

Marion Claire Hamiel, son of Henry W. and Louella (Eves) Hamiel, was born near Springdale in Cedar County, September 7, 1898, and died at his home in Tipton September 25, 1954, at the age of 56 years.

At the age of seven his parents moved to a farm south of Tipton where he attended a rural school and was graduated from Tipton High School in 1916. He entered the University of Iowa in 1917 and served in the Student's Army Training Corps in 1918. In January, 1919, he resumed his regular studies and was graduated from the college of liberal arts in June, 1921, and in 1923 received his doctor of laws degree.

After being admitted to the bar, he returned to Tipton where he engaged in the practice of law. He was elected Cedar county attorney in the spring of 1924 and served three consecutive terms in that office. While engaged in private practice, he served as city solicitor. In 1932 he was elected a member of the board of the Tipton consolidated school and was chairman for seventeen years.

He served as State Senator in the Forty-ninth General Assembly, resigning in 1942 to become district judge in the 18th judicial district, composed of Cedar, Linn and Jones Counties. He was acting in that capacity at the time of his death, having held court in Cedar Rapids the year before.

Marion Hamiel's religious life was grounded in the Society of Friends. He was born into a Methodist family, himself being a communicant of the Tipton Methodist Church. He was active in various organizations of the church and was also interested and active in the various local civic
