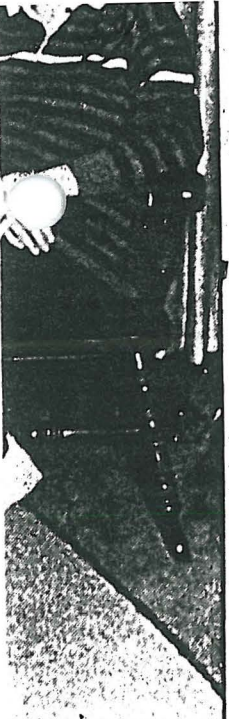

A farmer, Mr. Paullus was a charter member of the American Legion in Hampton, serving in the U.S. Army in World War I. He served two terms (1939 and 1941) in the Iowa House of Representatives.

When the county purchases property for public purposes, the payment offered to landowners is determined by multiplying the appraised value by a "right-of-way factor." Until Tuesday, the factor was 1.5. The amount offered to the property owner was 1.5 times the appraised value.

At the Dec. 27 meeting of the Franklin County Board of Supervisors, the board approved a change to 1.75. The board cited the belief that current market values don't take into account the high prices being paid for Franklin County property.

The change is effective December 1, 1988, on county projects that will be effected on Highway 3 to the Beeds Lake Road and on the road from Chapin Road to Beeds Lake.
