He was born in Ottumwa on Nov. 24, 1905, the son of Nicholas and Christina Hein Wagner.

He was a former Ottumwa resident and attorney, and attended Ottumwa High School where he was a star football and basketball player during the 1920's. He was a former state representative from Ottumwa.

Survivors include his widow, Verge; one son, Peter Wagner, La Jolla, Calif.; two brothers, John and Nick Wagner, both of Ottumwa; and one sister, Mrs. Theresa Sweeney, Macomb, Ill. He was preceded in death by six sisters and one brother.

Jameson said Exxon's earnings from petroleum and natural gas operations in the United States rose 16 per cent to \$715 million in 1972 from \$615 million last year, on a 14.1 per cent increase, he means that while earnings rose, particularly in the latter part of the year, these increased prices reflected higher raw material and production costs in supplying the additional sales volume," Jameson said.

Exxon is the second major company to report how it did financially in the fourth quarter of 1972, when the Arab embargo was begun and oil prices of petroleum and natural gas fuels climbed sharply.

Tuesday Cities Service, the 14th largest in the industry, said its fourth quarter earnings were nearly 50 per cent higher than its profits in a comparable period of 1972. Jameson said Exxon's return on shareholders' equity, investment, climbed in 1972 8.8 per cent from 12.8 per cent in 1972.

"I hope this signals the start of a period in which the corporation will again be earning a rate of return on investment which is comparable to that of leading companies in other industries," he said.

amid questions from critics about the oil companies' role in the nation's energy problems, the companies have maintained their rate of return on investment over the past 10 years has been low in comparison with many other industries.

Jameson said an adequate rate of return was necessary to finance the expansion, exploration and capital improvements which he said are needed to develop energy resources in the future. Over the next four years, he said, Exxon plans \$16 billion capital expenditures, about

Funeral for Joseph Nicholas Wagner, 69, of Banning, Calif., who died at 1:15 p.m. in a car accident about 13 miles east of Sweetwater, will be at 10 a.m. Friday in the Elliott-Hamill Chapel of Memories.

The Rev. Carl Wilson, pastor of Faith Temple, will officiate. Burial will be in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Wagner and the driver, Mary Ann Mallory, 65, of Palm Springs, Calif., were killed when their car left the road on Interstate 20 near Sweetwater.

The vehicle was traveling west at the time of the accident. The car went off the highway to the right, and traveled about 200 feet, according to Highway Patrolman Don Rannefeld.

Wagner was born Nov. 26, 1904, in Chicago, and was graduated from the University of Chicago. He married Vergie Cotton on Aug. 3, 1961, at Springfield, Ill.

After retiring from a law practice in Chicago, Wagner moved to Banning, Calif., in 1971.

Survivors include his wife of Lubbock; one son, Peter, of Miami; a foster daughter, Tanya Traves of Amarillo.

Final Ely Action Due

The Abilene City Council Thursday is expected to take final action on renaming Stadium Way as Judge Ely Boulevard.

Councilmen also will consider a report from a commission studying a proposed computer system for the Abilene Police Dept.

The Stadium Way change, passed on first reading at the council's last meeting Jan. 10, will name the street in honor of Judge Peter Ely, Sr. The local attorney, now 93, is known as one of the men responsible for the modern highway system.

Stadium Way is located east of Abilene, between state 20 and U.S. 80.

THE COMPUTER was first presented to the council at the last meeting, but action on it was postponed to allow council members time to study the proposal.

Also on the agenda are several items of routine business, including consideration of an ordinance to amend City Code provisions dealing with overgrown lots.

In addition, council members are to consider a resolution awarding a contract for improvements outlined in the 1973 Fall Assessment report. Part of the contract involves those improvements previously passed on to abutting property owners, with a public hearing.
