Dr. E. A. Moore Dies Sunday

Funeral Services Held Tuesday

, Practiced Most Of Life In Harlan

Dr. E. A. Moore, 68, local physician and surgeon died at his home here about 4:30 a. m. Sunday. His death was the result of a heart attack.

Active in Democratic politics, Dr. Moore served in the Iowa legislature from 1934 to 1940. He was one of the Democratic leaders in the house during his three terms and was active in obtaining legislation affecting state health problems and the medical profession.

The son of Dr. Edwin B. Moore, pioneer Harlan doctor, he was born on September 3, 1872 on a farm in Washington county. The family came to Harlan when the deceased was 6 years old.

Dr. Moore was educated in the Harlan public schools and attended Creighton University, re-ceiving his M. D. degree in 1901.

For 5 years before his gradu-ation from medical school he taught school in Cass county and in Jackson township. Following his graduation he was railway physician for 2 years for the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads. Then he came to Harlan.

Dr. Moore was a past member of the Harlan school board, a charter member and past president of the Harlan Field Club, a member of the Community club, the Kiwanis club, the Masonic lodge and the American Medical Association its

He was married in 1897 to Miss Effie Lathrop. He is survived by his wife; a son, Rex, of Ames; a daughter, Mrs. C. F. Peck of Decorah; two sisters, Mrs. Elva Errett of Austin, Minnesota and Mrs. Margaret Alcorn of Adair and a brother, Dr. Morris Moore of Walnut, also a past member of the legislature.



Had Served 3 Terms In The State Office

Dr. E. A. Moore, one of Harlan's oldest practicing physicians, died early Sunday morning following an illness of several weeks that had kept him confined to his home. Doctor Moore had not been well since the death of his brother, Dr. Fred Moore, who died in Des Moines a short time ago.

The son of Dr. Edwin B. Moore and Elizabeth Watters, he was born in Washington county, Sept. 3. 1872, and with his parents came to Harlan at the age of six. He attended the local school and later matriculated to Creighton University leaving there to teach in the county schools, serving as principal at Portsmouth for three years. He returned to Creighton and graduated from the medical department in 1901.

For two years he served as railroad physician for the Union Pacific and then established a practice in Harlan. His marriage to Miss Effie Lathrop took place, however, in 1897, and two children, Rex and Margaret were born.

He was a lifetime Democrat and inaugurated his political career by being elected county coroner in 1904 and for several succeeding terms. Later he served on the local school board and climaxed his political ambitions by being three times elected to the state legislature where he was an active member. He helped with many important state measures while in office and was a member of several key committees.

An ardent golfers, he was a familiar figure in various state tournaments and was a charter member of the Harlan Field Club. Last summer he served as president of the organization.

Other local organizations to prefit from his membership were the Kiwanis Club, Harlan Cummunity Club and the Masonic Lodge.

Chicago newspapers. From 1904-10 he worked for the Des Moines REGISTER and LEADER and the TRIBUNE. Resigning in 1910 on account of ill health he engaged in mining and ranching activities in New Mexico. Returning to Burlington in 1917, he became editor of the HAWKEYE in that year, and its publisher in 1927. When the HAWKEYE and the BURLINGTON GAZETTE combined in 1933, Garrett became the publisher of that paper. From 1925-1938 he was president of the Iowa Daily Press Association.

Actively interested in politics and twice postmaster of Burlington, he was also interested in his local history, as a descendent of David Rorer, a pioneer lawyer. He was vice president of the Old Des Moines County Historical Association, which he helped to form.

ARTHUR SCOTT HANFORD, financier, died in Sioux City, May 2, 1941. The son of Richard R. and Edna Chapin Hanford, he was born in Vinton, Iowa, March 2, 1863. Educated in the Vinton High School, he engaged in the produce business in Centreville, Dakota Territory, from 1884-1888. In the latter year he organized the Hanford Produce Company in Sioux City, which before it was sold forty years later had become one of the largest in the middle west. In 1931 he organized and became president of the First National Bank of Sioux City.

An ardent aviation enthusiast, he helped to build the first airport in Sioux City, and later became a director and chairman of the board of the Mid-Continent Airlines.

EDWIN A. MOORE, physician and legislator, died May 25, 1941, at his home in Harlan, Iowa. The son of Edwin B. and Elizabeth W. Moore, he was born in Washington County, Iowa, in 1872. Educated in the Harlan, Iowa, public schools, he afterwards taught school five years in Portsmouth, Iowa. He was graduated from the Creighton University medical department in 1901. A Democrat, he was elected to represent Shelby County in 1934 and again in 1936.

FRANK A. MOSCRIP, newspaper editor, died in Marshalltown, Iowa, April 19, 1941. Born January 30, 1859, in Rockton, Illinois, and educated in the district schools, he taught school as a young man, while beginning his newspaper career as a correspondent for an Illinois newspaper at the same time. He became first publisher of the Milledgeville, Illinois, weekly newspaper, later joining the Chicago TIMES before coming to Iowa to teach school and run the weekly paper at Popejoy. Later still he became associated with the DES MOINES

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character and public service of the Honorable Edwin A. Moore, a former member of the Forty-sixth, Fortyseventh and Forty-eighth General Assemblies of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Edwin A. (Gus) Moore was born in Washington county, Iowa, September 3, 1872, and passed away at his home in Harlan, Iowa, May 25, 1941, at the age of 69 years.

When Dr. Moore was six years old, his father, Dr. Edwin B. Moore, moved to Harlan, and this was his home from that time on. The late Dr. Moore attended Harlan schools and then entered Creighton University. He left Creighton to teach school for three years, then returned to take his medical course and graduated in 1901. After his graduation, Dr. Moore served as railroad physician for the Union Pacific Railroad for two years, and following that started his practice at Harlan and continued there until he passed away.

Dr. Moore is survived by his widow; one son, Rex; one daughter, Margaret; one brother, former state senator, Dr. Morris Moore, Walnut, Iowa; two sisters, Mrs. H. A. Alcorn, Adair, Iowa, and Mrs. Elva Erret, Austin, Minnesota. Another brother, the late Dr. Fred Moore of Des Moines, Iowa, passed away shortly before the death of Dr. Edwin A. Moore. Dr. Fred A. Moore was a man of great ability and nationally known in the medical profession, especially in children's diseases. Dr. Edwin A. Moore was quite ill at the time of his brother's death and never fully recovered from that time on.

Dr. Moore was very active in community affairs and held several county offices. He was especially interested in sports of all kinds, and was a member of the Champion Hose Team of the state of Iowa. He was known all over the state for his golfing ability. In 1934 he was elected to the Iowa Legislature and served three terms in the House of Representatives. He was a member of the Public Health Committee while in the House and in this capacity he rendered various services to the medical profession. It was while he was on this committee that, through his ability, he was instrumental in procuring the passage of the Basic Science Law in 1935. By his death the medical profession lost one of its greatest supporters. In the passing of Dr. Edwin A. Moore, Shelby county has lost one of its leading citizens.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fiftieth General Assembly of the State of Iowa in Regular Session, That in the death of Dr. Edwin A. Moore, the people of Shelby county and of the entire state of Iowa have sustained a great loss.

Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the Journal of the House, and the Chief Clerk be directed to forward an enrolled copy to the family of the deceased.




