Charles H. Scholz, attorney, dies on New Year's Day

Charles H. Scholz, 50, of Carbonado road, prominent Oskaloosa attorney, died Monday at 11:48 a. m. at Mahaska hospital. Death was attributed to a coronary heart attack which followed complications resulting from pneumonia.

Scholz, who entered the hospital Monday morning, suffered a first heart attack in May, 1957.

Mr. Scholz came to Oskaloosa in 1949 to become associated with Ned Gilbert in the law firm of Gilbert & Scholz and remained in that partnership until the fall of 1954 when he entered practice for himself.

He served as Mahaska county attorney two terms, starting January, 1957. He acquired the former Lacey estate building, 115 north Market street, and remodeled it for offices, occupying the rear suite of rooms.

JFK to fight for medical care for aged

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—President Kennedy enters 1962 determined to win passage of his controversial medical care for the aged legislation financed through social security and plans to press for federal aid to education on the collegiate as well as on secondary school levels.

Based on the authority of associates and others who have talked and worked with the president, it is possible to present the president's attitude on a number of domestic and foreign matters.

THESE SOURCES indicated that in addition to winning passage of his medical care plan and expanding federal aid to education, the president also:

—Believes he had strong bipartisan support for liberalization of the reciprocal trade program;

—Intends to fight for creation of a new cabinet department for urban affairs and housing;

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Officer slain in revolt to be decorated

LISBON (UPI)—The Portuguese Army ministry appealed Tuesday for "massive attendance" at the funeral of an officer killed in Monday's abortive revolt as a token of support for Premier Antonio de Oliveira Azar.

The body of Lt. Col. Jaime da Fonseca, cut down by rebel machinegunners during the shortlived uprising in Beja, was found in state in a church. The government announced it would confer a posthumous decoration on the colonel at the funeral service.

Fonseca was the only known government casualty of the revolt.

TROOPS throughout the country were still alerted Tuesday, but the nation appeared in

Fonseca, who was an army order secretary, was shot down as he hastened to the scene of the uprising, a town about 125 miles south of here, where 40 to 50 rebels, mostly civilians masquerading as soldiers, had seized an army barrack.

Loyal troops quickly disarmed the rebels, killing two of them and wounding five. At least 14 were taken prisoner.

AMONG THE prisoners identified today was 37-year-old Captain Joao Varela Gomes, a parliamentarian who ran for parliament as an opposition candidate in November's election. Varela is believed to be the leader of the insurrection, the latest in a series of troubles which have plagued Portugal during the past year.

He married Dorothea Menenga of Santa Monica, Calif., on Oct. 20, 1946.

Mr. Scholz was a member of the Masonic orders, the Shrine, Elks, Oskaloosa Chamber of Commerce, Oskaloosa Rotary, being a charter member of the Rotary club at New Hampton, the Presbyterian church and Elmhurst country club.

He was a member of the Mahaska county Bar association; Iowa State Bar association; American Bar association; and the National District Attorney association.

Surviving is the wife, Mrs. Dorothea Scholz; a brother, Milton Scholz of Alta Vista and his mother, Mrs. Clara Scholz of Alta Vista.

Services will be at the Newman funeral chapel Wednesday, Jan. 3, at 2 p. m. with burial at Forest cemetery. Rev. J. Riley West of First Presbyterian church will officiate.

Charles H. Scholz, 50, attor-
ney of Oskaloosa who was born

law at New Hampton, died on
