Six Legislators To Represent Iowa At Funeral Service

Carroll Legislator Died Friday Evening at 6 O'Clock

Court House Will Close During Hour of Rites

Des Moines, Ia. (AP)—LaMar Foster of the Iowa house of representatives today named a committee of six to attend the funeral Monday morning of State Representative A. H. Baumhover, 43, of Carroll, Iowa, who died last night.

The committee includes, William J. Dressen, Breda; Frank Whitney, Summers; Thomas Rutherford, Jr., Audubon; E. W. Scott, Lake View; Stanley Thompson, Yale and Claude Johnson, Rippey.

Baumhover died as the result of injuries suffered Monday when he was run over by a binder on his farm near Carroll.

A. H. Baumhover, Carroll county's representative in the state legislature, died at the St. Anthony hospital at 6 p. m. Friday from injuries received early Monday morning when he was run over by a binder which he was operating on his farm north of Carroll.

The seriousness of his injuries made his recovery doubtful from the beginning, but until Wednesday evening it was thought he had an even chance for life. From that time on, however, he gradually grew worse, sinking rapidly during the last few hours.

About five hours after he was injured Monday morning he underwent an operation for a ruptured liver. He also suffered other internal injuries and had several broken ribs.

Funeral services will be held at 9 o'clock Monday morning at the St. Lawrence church, with the Rev. J. A. Cordes reading the requiem mass. Burial will be in the parish cemetery.

TAX REFUNDS TO BE READY IN 10 DAYS

The county treasurer's of-
fice announced today that it
had received Carroll coun-
ty's homestead tax refund
check for \$108,266.03, and
that the work of spreading
the refunds over the sever-
al tax accounts was going
forward as rapidly as pos-
sible.

It was stated, however,
that it would be approxi-
mately ten days before the
office would be ready to re-
ceive second half tax pay-
ments which are to be cred-
ited with the refund, as the
money must be apportioned
according to rule to every
homestead owner in the
county.

Instructions from the
Iowa State Board of Assess-
ment and Review accompan-
ied the check and the divi-
sion of the funds is being
carried out accordingly as
rapidly as possible.

Until the necessary book
work is done, however, the
treasurer will be unable to
make credits on any pay-
ments which are brought in
for the second half.

quiem mass.

Mr. Baumhover, a son of Mr.
and Mrs. Henry Baumhover, who
live on a farm north of Carroll on
highway No. 71, was born on a
farm in Carroll county on October
5, 1893. After attending the rural
schools and high school in Carroll
he engaged in farming.

Mr. Baumhover was married in
June, 1917, to Miss Josephine
Kanne. They have seven children:
Dennis, Alfred, Leola, Margaret,
Ruth, Richard and Rita.

IN LEGISLATURE

Mr. Baumhover, a democrat,
was serving his second term in the
state legislature at the time of his
death. He was elected to the
house of representatives in 1934
and was returned to this office in
1936.

At the last session of the legis-
lature he was appointed by LaMar
Foster, speaker of the house, as
a member of nine committees and
chairman of a tenth, the dairy and
food committee. The other commit-
tees of which he was a member
were: agriculture, animal indus-
try; appropriations; compensation
for public officers; greater Iowa;
liquor control; public utilities,
roads and highways and ways and
means.

ACTIVE IN COMMUNITY

Mr. Baumhover had always been
actively interested in community
affairs. He was president of the
Carroll county farm bureau from
1923 to 1927. He had also served
as treasurer of the corn-hog con-
trol association. At the time of
death he was secretary of the
warehouse board and corn sealing
committee.

He was a trustee of the St. Law-
rence church and director of the
church choir.

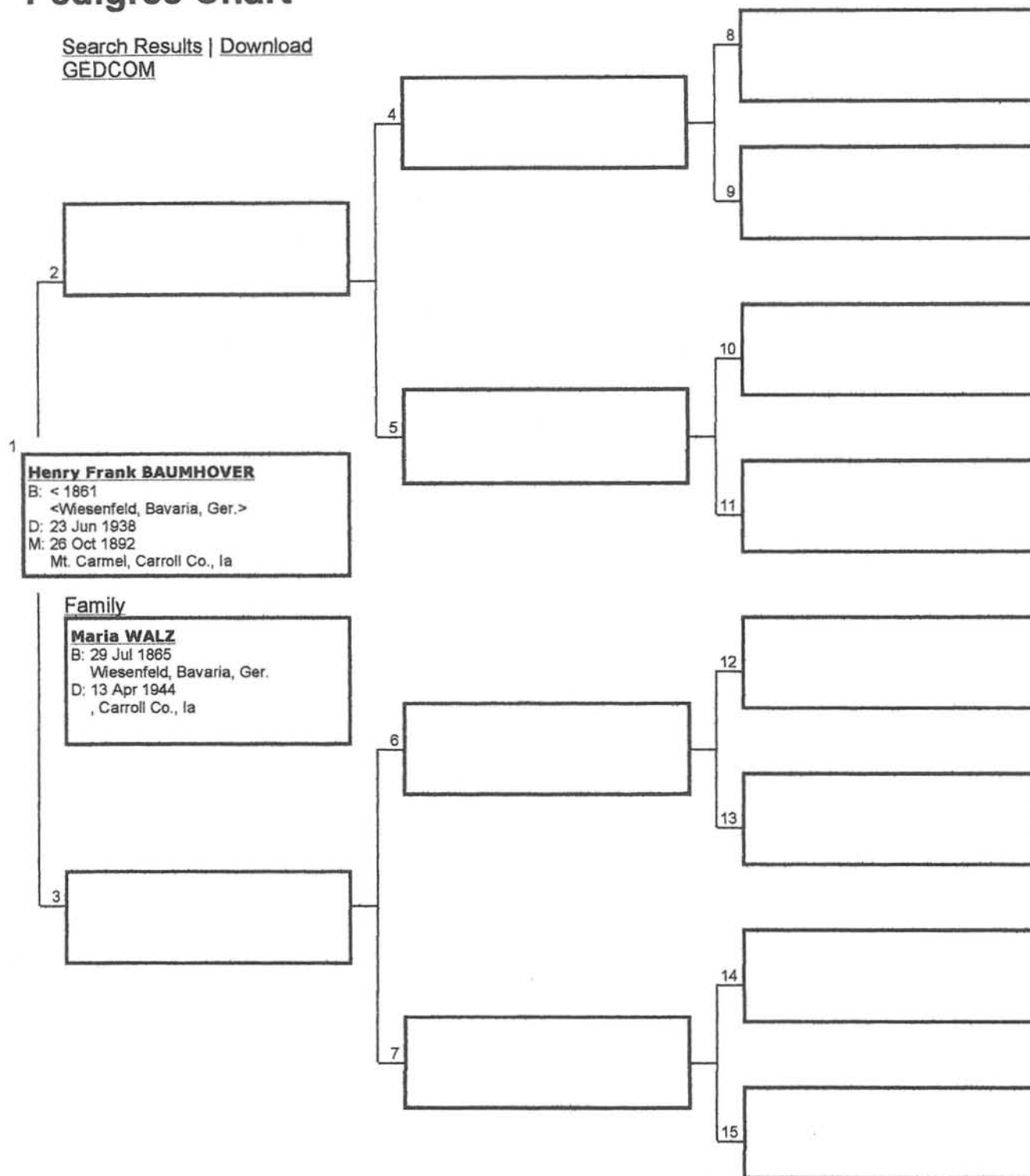
