I. G. Chrystal Dies; Former State Senator

I. G. Chrystal, 77, prominent Coon Rapids citizen, and former state senator, died Dec. 25 at St. Anthony's Hospital in Carroll where he had been a patient since Dec. 1.

Funeral services will be held Friday, Dec. 28, at 10 a. m., at Annunciation Church in Coon Rapids with the Rev. Robert L. Dougherty officiating. The Rosary will be recited at 8 p. m. tonight (Thursday) at the Huffman Funeral Chapel in Coon Rapids.

Mr. Chrystal was born in Wapello County, Iowa on Sept. 27, 1885 and public school work, hotel business, and farming were included among his occupations.

He was elected senator from the 48th senatorial district of Iowa and served until 1939 during the 45th, 45th extra, 46th and 47th General Assemblies of Iowa. He was very active in county politics in the Democratic party. He was also a director of the Iowa Savings Bank at Coon Rapids for many years. He made his home on his farm north of Coon Rapids, although he was retired from active farming.
