Sen. "Dan" Mason Died Friday In A Hospital Here

Eugene Irving Mason, son of Eugene H. and Sarah Manatt Mason, was born May 6, 1879, in Poweshiek county, Iowa, and passed away at 12:30 Friday morning, Feb. 8, 1946, at St. Francis hospital in Grinnell, after an illness of several months.

"Dan," as he was familiarly known, was a graduate of Brooklyn high school and attended law school at Iowa City. Later he was admitted to the bar in Oklahoma. He served as a member of the Iowa state senate, representing the 12th District from 1933 through 1938. For a number of years he has been operating several hundred acres of farm land in Poweshiek county.

On Dec. 12, 1910, he was united in marriage to Rae H. Lynch of Phillipsburg, Kas. To this union was born one daughter, Faith, Mrs. Charles J. Santoro, of Brooklyn, Iowa.

Besides his daughter he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Hope Raffensperger of Victor.

He was preceded in death by his wife, his parents, and two sisters, Mrs. Rufus Abernathy of Roy, N. M., and one who died in infancy.

Funeral services were held on Monday, Feb. 11, at 10:30 a. m., at the McAnich Funeral Home in Victor with Rev. E. W. F. Heller of Brooklyn officiating. Miss Thursia Manatt of Brooklyn presided at the organ. The body was laid to rest beside his wife in the crypt in the mausoleum at Marengo.

Relatives from a distance who attended the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Court H. Houseworth of Harveyville, Kas., Mr. Ed Lynch of Kansas City, Mo., Mrs. A. E. Carter of Omaha, Neb., and Charles Manatt of Cedar Rapids.

Liquor Store Receipts For 1945 Show Increase

Receipts from the liquor store in Montezuma show a 27.61 per cent increase for 1945 over 1944, according to a report from the Iowa liquor control commission. Total receipts for 1945 were \$81,058.10 as compared to \$63,521.10 for 1944, a gain of \$17,537.

December sales of the liquor store went up 46.77 per cent over those of December a year ago, the figure standing at \$2,383.60 for 1945 as against \$8,437.46 for 1944, an increase of \$3,946.14.

Newton's liquor store showed a gain for the year of only 7.59 per cent but its receipts were much larger than those of the Montezuma store; \$263,062.76 for 1945 and \$244,502.92 for 1944, a gain of \$18,559.84. However, during December the Newton store upped its sales over those for December in the preceding year from \$27,944.25 in 1944 to \$42,644.13 in 1945, a gain of \$14,719.88 or 52.68 per cent.

The Oskaloosa liquor store showed a net gain for the year of 29.81 per cent, the figures showing \$213,428.77 for 1945 as against \$164,292.28 for 1944, an increase of \$49,136.49. Oskaloosa's December sales were also way up over those of December a year ago, showing \$32,436.22 as against \$21,356.90, a gain of \$11,079.32 or 51.88 per cent.

Marshalltown also shows a large increase, figures for the year standing at \$375,254.20 for 1945 as against \$308,998.10 for 1944, a gain of 21.44 per cent. December sales of \$60,718.50 for 1945 were \$20,794.94, or 52 per cent greater than the 1944 figure of \$39,990.68.
