John Calhoun dead at 67

John N. Calhoun, 67, Burlington attorney who was active in politics and government for 30 years, died at 8:40 a.m. Monday, Nov. 1, at Memorial

hospital Mercy unit. Mr. Calhoun lived with his wife, the former Dorothea Rains, at 515 S. 10th.

He was state senator from 1932-1936 from Van Buren and Jefferson counties, and was later a 2-term county attorney in Des Moines county, and an unsuccessful candidate for the US Senate from Iowa and for the First District congressional post. He was a former alternate municipal judge here.

Survivors include two sons, John R., Long Beach, Calif., and Clifford J., Boulder, Colo.; daughter, Carol Calhoun, New York, N.Y., and six grandchildren.

Mr. Calhoun was born Dec. 2, 1903, at Birmingham, the son of Orange and Ethel Nelson Calhoun. He married Dorothea Rains June 25, 1929, at Fairfield.

Former Teacher

A graduate of Birmingham high school and Parsons college, Fairfield, Mr. Calhoun received his law degree from the University of Iowa in 1929, the year he was admitted to the bar. He had taught high school at Lockridge in 1923-25.

He practiced in Keosauqua until 1937, during which time he served two terms as state senator.

Mr. Calhoun moved to Burlington where he practiced law until his extended illness.

He had enlisted in the National Guard in 1936, and was called to duty as a master sergeant in 1941. He served approximately 8 1/2 years active duty, and was released in 1948 as a lieutenant colonel.

Funeral for victim of crash is Tuesday

MT. PLEASANT — Funeral for 14-year-old Dwight David Shahan, who was killed in a traffic accident Saturday, Oct. 30, will be 2 p.m. Tuesday at First United Presbyterian church.

Officiating will be the minister of the church, the Rev. Gerald Roseberry, and the minister of Burlington Unitarian Fellowship, Raymond Rohrbough. Burial will be in Winfield Scott Township cemetery. The body is at Crane-Ewart-Young funeral home.

The youth was a passenger in a car driven by his father, Leonidus S. Shahan, which was involved in a collision on Old US M, 1 1/2 miles west of Mt. Pleasant.

Shahan was injured in the accident and was reported in fairly good condition at Henry County Memorial hospital Monday.

Also injured was the driver of the other machine, Robert Farley, 47, Mt. Pleasant, who was charged with drunken driving. He was ticketed at the hospital, where he was reported in fairly good condition Monday.

Two passengers in the Farley car were injured: David J. Messer, 16, Mt. Pleasant, was treated and dismissed, but Dennis Leroy Calhoun, 23, was transferred to University hospitals, Iowa City. He was reported in critical condition Monday.

The boy was the son of Leonidus S. and Beryl Morris Shahan and was born Aug. 26, 1927, at Kirkville, Mo.

A freshman at Mt. Pleasant high school, he was a member of Boy Scout Troop 27 and Chicagoa Hock Hound club.

Surviving: The parents; two brothers and two sisters: Lonny, Mark, Noele, and Teresa Shahan, all at home, and grandparents Arthur Morris, Kirkville, Mo., and Mrs. Carrie Dayball of St. Louis.

Allison was ticketed for failure to yield.

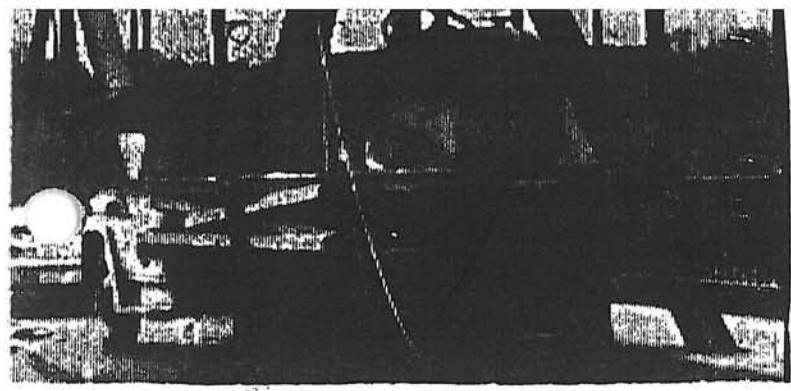
Woman loses money when cart switched

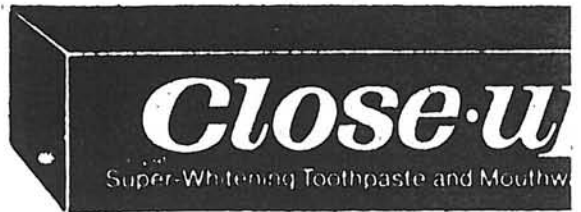
