J. R. Campbell, widely known Osceola man, died unexpectedly at Huntsville, Alabama today. Details of his death are unknown.

Mr. and Mrs. Campbell had been spending a brief vacation at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Harold Epperly in Alabama and had expected to start home today.

No arrangements for the services had been made today.

Campbell, for many years a salesman with a territory in Southern Iowa, had retired several years ago. He was a member of the Iowa General Assembly from Clarke county about 20 years ago. He was a charter member of the Osceola Rotary club and a member of the Christian church.

Survivors include his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Helen Elder of Ames and Mrs. Virginia Epperly of Huntsville, and four grandchildren.

J. R. Campbell, son of C. A. and Mary L. Campbell, was born April 20, 1881, near Fairmont, Marion county, W. Virginia. He passed away at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Epperly, Huntsville, Alabama, Dec. 7, 1953, at the age of 72 years, 7 months and 17 days. He came to Iowa with his mother when a child.

On December 25, 1905 he was

united in marriage to Louella Cannon, in Osceola and to this union were born two daughters. He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Harold Epperly of Huntsville, Alabama, and Mrs. Clarence Elder of Ames, Iowa, the sons-in-law and four grandchildren. There are other relatives and a host of friends.

Following his graduation from Simpson college he taught for a period of three years at Maryville and De Soto, Mo. After their marriage they started housekeeping in Oskaloosa, Iowa, where he was associated in the office of the Hawkeye Lumber Company. Upon the advice of his physician to seek employment which would take him outdoors he took a position as a traveling salesman which occupation he followed for a period of 20 years. He had been in semi-retirement for the past 15 years.

Mr. Campbell was active in

civic and community affairs, having served in the Iowa legislature and as president of the Osceola Rotary club. He was a charter member of this club and was an active member until the time of his passing. He was an active elder in the Christian church and had served as a Sunday school superintendent and teacher and in other places of leadership in the church. His life had many outreaches and influenced many people for good. Under all circumstances he conducted himself as a noble Christian gentleman.

Funeral services were held from the Webster funeral home Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. Warren Hile officiating. Burial was in Fremont cemetery.

ROBERT D. BLUE, Eagle Grove.—Representative from Wright county, was born in Eagle Grove, Iowa on September 24, 1898. Educated in the public schools of Eagle Grove, the Iowa State College, and the college of law at Drake university. Has engaged in the active practice of law at Eagle Grove since 1922, served as county attorney of Wright county from October 6, 1924 to January 1, 1931, and as city attorney of Eagle Grove. Alternate delegate to the republican national convention in Chicago in 1932. Married to Cathlene Beale of Tama and has two children, Barbara and Donald. Member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Phi Alpha Delta fraternities, Masonic lodge and Methodist church. A republican.

A. H. BONNSTETTER, West Bend.—Representative from Kossuth county, was born on a farm near West Bend, Iowa, November 20, 1892. He was educated in the schools of this locality and took a two-year normal course at Highland Park college. He taught in the public schools of Iowa three years and completed four years of work at Valparaiso university, Valparaiso, Indiana. In August, 1919, he was married to Miss Charlotte Anderegg. They have one son, Rex. About the time of his marriage Mr. Bonnstetter went back to farming. He has since acquired and is managing a pure bred herd of dairy cattle. An active supporter of farm organizations. He has been serving on the school board for a number of years and is a member of the Masonic order. Elected to state legislature in 1930, 1932 and 1934. A democrat.

L. C. BOWERS, Kent.—Representative from Union county, was born in Henry county, Iowa, September 3, 1867. Educated in rural schools, high school and Iowa State Teachers college. Taught as principal of Iowa town schools for twelve years and entered the mercantile business in Kent, Iowa, in 1900, continuing to the present. Married in 1906 to Alta M. Toland, and has one son, Virgil L. Actively identified in his home community first as school treasurer, then as secretary for twenty-five years. A member of the Union county board of education from the time of the enactment of the law creating that body to the present. Republican precinct committeeman twenty-five years. Member of the I. O. O. F., representing that order in grand lodge six years and serving one year as grand conductor of the order. Elected representative in 1932 and reelected in 1934. A republican.

DON W. BURLINGTON, Sioux City.—Representative from Woodbury county, was born at Pocahontas, Iowa, October 25, 1909. He attended Morningside college in Sioux City and graduated from the State University of Iowa law college in 1931, and he is now practicing law in Sioux City. He was president of the junior chamber of commerce of Sioux City in 1933, and received the nation junior of commerce distinguished service award in 1934. He is unmarried and a member of the Methodist church. Serving first term in the legislature. A democrat.

J. R. CAMPBELL, Osceola.—Representative from Clarke county, was born in Marion county, West Virginia, April 20, 1881. Father having died in 1882, moved with mother and sister to a farm in Clarke county, Iowa, in the spring of 1883. With exception of about five years, has lived in Clarke county since that time. Was married in 1905 to Luella M. Cannon, a Clarke county teacher. Has two daughters, Helen and Virginia. Attended Simpson school of business, Indianola, Iowa, and taught one year in same school and later in business schools in Maryville, Missouri, and DeSoto, Missouri. Returned to Iowa in 1906 to engage in office work and later was traveling salesman for about eighteen years. Was member and president of Osceola school board and at present is engaged in life insurance business. A member of Christian church. Serving first term. A republican.

MARLEY D. CLARK, Mt. Vernon.—Representative from Linn county, the son of Oliver and Barbara Clark, was born in Linn county. His paternal grandfather came to the county in 1837, with William Abbe, who was the first settler to bring his family
